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**SUBJECT: SOLID WASTE SERVICES BEHAVIOR MODIFICATION STUDY**

In March, the Solid Waste Services Division of the Code Compliance Department will begin a behavior modification study to better understand the factors that influence people in Fort Worth whether to recycle or not. The goal is to use the data and the perceptions of the participants to develop Community-Based Social Marketing techniques to improve our current recycling program.

We have engaged the professional services of Action Research, a consulting firm referred to us by Keep America Beautiful (KAB). This is a pilot project of which we were asked by KAB to participate to help them learn behavior modification techniques to be used nationwide.

The first step of the project is to prioritize target behaviors. To accomplish this, Solid Waste Services will conduct a waste audit of 400 randomly selected households throughout the city. Materials from both the garbage and recycling bins from these households will be audited and characterized for a total of 800 cart audits. Residents will receive replacement carts that same day for the carts that were removed and receive written notice outlining the purpose of the waste audit on the same day.

Residents will be advised by the written notice that during this audit portion of the study, the City will remain responsible for handling their waste – just as it is every week – and the sorting process and proper disposition of the waste and recycling will be monitored for their security.

The second step of the project will help staff to better understand the factors that influence people in Fort Worth to recycle or not recycle. To carry out this step, our consultant, Action Research, will conduct in-person interviews with the households that participated in the cart audits. It is estimated this will take place in April.

The solid waste staff will use the information gleaned from the audits of both the garbage and recycling carts and, through the interviews, determine the factors that influence recycling behavior by our residents to fine tune our public outreach efforts. The data gained through the waste characterization study will also be critical information for the upcoming Comprehensive Solid Waste Management Plan.


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SUBJECT: JANUARY 2014 – SALES TAX UPDATE

Sales tax revenue represents approximately 20% of the City’s General Fund budget. Staff is committed to providing you regular updates on this important and sometimes volatile revenue source. The Texas Comptroller’s Office posted January 2014 collection results on March 12th. Actual receipts are dependent upon the timeliness and accuracy of sales tax payers’ returns. In this report, you will see Fort Worth’s sales tax collection compared to last year and the impact on the current year’s budget.

January Net Sales Tax Collections (10-year History)




The City’s net sales tax collection is up \$253,090 or 2.9% compared to this month last year. These collections are the best on record for the month of January. As depicted in the table below, the City experienced **\$375,995 or 4.4%** in positive growth when compared to last year’s current period collections for the same month. Current period collections include only transactions that occurred within the month, so this number reflects pure economic activity.

The City is projecting to collect **\$1,439,003** or **1.2%** more than the FY2014 adopted General Fund budget. As depicted above, you will also see how the positive results are affecting our partner agencies. These are the projected collections for the fiscal year and while they are encouraging, Staff recommends maintaining a conservative forecast for FY2014 as we continue to experience uncertainty with the national economy and potential audit adjustments from the Comptroller's Office.

**SUBJECT: REGULATION OF GAMING ROOMS AND GAMING MACHINES***Background*

A game room is a business operated solely for the purpose of amusement, operating gaming machines. Gaming machines, such as eight-liners, are coin-operated electronic gaming machines that resemble a slot machine. A player “wins” if a horizontal, vertical or diagonal row of objects line up. There are multiple variants of gaming machines, including video reel, video keno and sweepstakes software. The cost to play varies and the prizes for winning vary.

Gaming machines are legal in Texas if they meet the definition contained in Section 47.01(4) (B) of the Texas Penal Code. Under current law, a gaming machine is legal if it is used “only for bona fide amusement purposes, awards the player exclusively with non-cash merchandise prizes, toys, or novelties, or a representation of value redeemable for those items, that have a wholesale value available from a single play of the game or device of not more than 10 times the amount charged to play the game or device once or \$5, whichever is less.”

Game rooms such as Chuck E. Cheese, Putt-Putt and other amusement arcades that award players with inexpensive non-cash prizes, toys or additional plays are legal in Texas. Game rooms that award the player with pay-outs of cash, gift cards or gift certificates are not legal.

The difficulty in enforcing Section 47.01(4) (B) is that the law is unclear as to when a gaming machine’s pay-outs are illegal and the costs and logistics in investigating and prosecuting cases.

Current Enforcement of Section 47.01(4) (B)

According to the Police Department’s Information Management Division, there are approximately 131 documented game rooms located within the City limits. Game rooms are allowed in all but one of the commercial zoning districts (ER, neighborhood commercial restricted) and all industrial zoning districts as an indoor amusement land use. The documented game rooms are brought to the Police Department’s attention through numerous sources, including citizen complaints, officer discovery, and in some instances, the on-set of a criminal offense perpetrated against a patron of the game room itself. The clientele of game rooms range from the criminal element to the average citizen. The citizens are often older and known to carry cash, making them easy victims of robberies, assaults, and thefts.

The Police Department has approached the enforcement aspect of illegal game rooms in two ways. The first has been in an overt manner utilizing uniform patrol in an administrative-type inspection in conjunction with Code Compliance, the Health Department, the Fire Department, and the State Comptroller’s Office. In the East Division, ten businesses were targeted, six of which remain closed. In the North Division, three were targeted, two of which remain closed. the game rooms and seek to make a gambling case against the establishment. Two cases generated by the Vice Section this year led to numerous arrests, the confiscation of \$13,231 in cash, and the seizure of 64 Mother Boards (the nucleus of the machine) from the illegal gambling devices.

Efforts are underway to aid the Police Department in their enforcement of state gambling laws by involving various City departments and governmental entities in a unified approach to reducing the number of game rooms and gaming machines operating illegally and the crimes that occur as a direct result of their operations. Such efforts, supported by the City Attorney's Office, include the pursuit of Chapter 125, Texas Civil Practice and Remedies Code – Common Nuisance litigation, possible revocation by the Planning and Development Department of a certificate of occupancy where the use of the property is contrary to the specified use of the issued certificate, revisions to the zoning ordinance, and working with the various county district attorneys' offices to increase the prosecution of gambling cases in addition to civil forfeiture actions.

Ability of the City to regulate gaming machines and game rooms

Texas Occupations Code Sections 2153.451-453 authorize county and municipal regulation of coin-operated machines through the imposition of an occupation tax and allows regulation through zoning. The City is authorized to impose an occupation tax on coin-operated machines that may not exceed one-fourth of the state tax. TEX. OCC. CODE § 2153.451(b). The current State occupation tax rate on each coin-operated machine is \$60; the City may impose a tax of \$15 per year per machine. Any other fees imposed by the City should relate to the cost of enforcing regulations. While a city may not discriminate against a business, commercial or retail, solely because it operates a gaming machine, permissible zoning regulations under the statute include restricting the exhibition of a gaming machine within 300 feet of a church, school or hospital.

Next steps

Possible next steps the City Council may consider to regulate game rooms or gaming machines include:

- amending Chapter 20, Article II, "Amusements" by adding Division 6 to:
 - Define a gaming machine and game room;
 - Establish the license and application process for game rooms and gaming machines;
 - Impose an occupation tax per machine as allowed by State statute (up to \$15 per gaming machine);
 - Impose license and inspection fees;
 - Impose regulations to provide for unobstructed windows, safety and machine testing;

- Impose a limit on the hours of operation;
 - Impose age restrictions; and
 - Limit the number of gaming machines allowed within a game room.
- amending the Zoning Ordinance to:

 - Impose distance restrictions of 300 feet between game rooms to churches, schools and hospitals;
 - Impose distance regulations between game room locations;
 - Add a definition of game room; and
 - Define indoor amusement.

Electronic-cigarettes (e-cigarettes) are 3” to 6” tubes containing a battery, a reservoir which holds a liquid (consisting of water, nicotine, flavoring, and other substances), and an atomizer which converts the liquid into a vapor which is inhaled. E-cigarettes are becoming increasingly popular and are now widely available for purchase from specialty vendors, grocery stores, and convenience stores.

E-cigarettes do not contain tobacco (although the nicotine is derived from tobacco) and there is no combustion involved in their use. Consequently, no smoke is created or ingested by the user, nor is there exposure of nearby individuals to second-hand smoke. E-cigarettes are not regulated by the Fort Worth smoking ordinance for the same reason: E-cigarettes are not “lighted” and there is no smoke or combustion involved.

There are differences of opinion among health experts regarding e-cigarettes, because although nicotine itself is addictive and unhealthful, e-cigarettes do not expose users to the high level of carcinogens or the carbon monoxide experienced with the use of regular cigarettes. Many users of e-cigarettes claim that they have been able to reduce or eliminate smoking through the use of e-cigarettes. Thus the dilemma is that when tobacco smokers switch to e-cigarettes, they may reduce the net health risk to the population, however when non-smokers become users of e-cigarettes (particularly minors) they are introducing a new health risk factor into the population.

An area of concern is the fact the liquid used in e-cigarettes is often flavored and some of the flavors appeal to minors (including candy and dessert flavors). A restriction that is targeted to preventing minors from obtaining e-cigarettes presents a more defensible legal rationale with regard to protecting public health as compared to restrictions on adults who may be smokers tapering-off tobacco.

Ability of the City to regulate e-cigarettes

The federal government does not currently regulate e-cigarettes, but is studying the health effects and considering options for regulation. It is likely that at some point the FDA will enact some form of federal regulations. The State of Texas does not currently regulate e-cigarettes. This has caused many cities to consider whether local regulation is appropriate.

There is no federal or state law preempting the ability of a municipality in Texas from regulating e-cigarettes. If at some future time the FDA or the state enacts regulations, any ordinance the City has may become preempted and would need to be revised or repealed. At the current time, however, the City’s general home-rule authority provides the legal basis to enact ordinances

regulating e-cigarettes, including a ban on sales to adults and/or minors, as well as a prohibition on their use in City facilities.

What other cities are doing with regard to e-cigarettes

Currently the largest cities in Texas do not regulate e-cigarettes, nor do any of the cities of comparable size to Fort Worth in the US. Some of the smaller municipalities have enacted restrictions on e-cigarettes. The Texas cities that have enacted ordinances are typically directed to either the sales to minors (Lewisville), or the possession by minors (Murphy), or both (Rockwall). One city (Richardson) limits specialty e-cigarette stores to particular zoning districts with a special use permit.

Smoking Ordinance and Bars

The City Council adopted its Smoking Ordinance on August 21, 2007 which became effective January 1, 2008. Prior to the ordinance's adoption, the City Council initiated a public process to seek citizen input on whether the City Council should strengthen its smoking regulations. An Ad-Hoc Work Group was formed, public meetings were held and recommendations were then made to the City Council to strengthen the City's ordinance.

The City's Smoking Ordinance prohibits smoking in public places. However, smoking is allowed in bars, up to twenty five percent of rooms at a hotel or motel, outdoor dining areas, bingo parlors, private clubs, retail tobacco stores and facilities where smoking is part of a stage production.

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DISCLAIMER: This report provides a snapshot of the Fort Worth Police Department's National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) data that was queried from the Records Management System (RMS) on January 30, 2014. The Department's RMS is updated regularly based on ongoing investigations. The data in this snapshot has been reviewed and certified by the Texas Department of Public Safety. Since this is a snapshot, data queried before or after this date is apt to change and may vary from other reports.

Section I.

Understanding Crime Reporting

1.1 National Perspective on Reporting Crime: Transitioning from Uniform Crime Reporting to National Incident-Based Reporting System

According to the National Incident-Based Reporting System, Volume 1: Data Collection Guidelines, by the U.S. Department of Justice,

“Since the establishment of the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program in 1930, the volume, diversity, and complexity of crime steadily increased while the UCR Program remained virtually unchanged. Recognizing the need to address crime’s growing challenge, the law enforcement community in the late 1970s called for a thorough study of the UCR Program with the objective of revising the Program to meet law enforcement’s needs into the twenty-first century. The National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) is the result of that study.”

In January 1989, the FBI began accepting NIBRS data from a handful of agencies. As more contributing law enforcement agencies learn about the rich data available through incident-based reporting (and as resources permit), more agencies are implementing the NIBRS. Although participation in NIBRS is purely voluntary, about 44 percent of all law enforcement agencies were NIBRS certified as of May 2011 (based on that year’s data submissions). Until an agency becomes certified, it continues to submit data in accordance with the requirements of the traditional UCR Program. Because the transition to the new system will take considerable time, the national UCR Program will continue to collect, process, and publish traditional UCR data. This is accomplished by collecting data in the old format from agencies not participating in NIBRS and by extracting traditional summary data from the more comprehensive submissions of agencies participating in NIBRS.

The result is a continuation of the traditional statistical time series and a gradual phase-in of the newer forms of statistics made possible by NIBRS. This parallel operation of the old and new systems will be maintained until it is determined that the old system can be discontinued.

1.2 Fort Worth’s Crime Report

Fort Worth understands the importance of collecting and reporting detailed, accurate, and meaningful incident-based data. In January 2006, Fort Worth was certified to participate in the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) and began reporting NIBRS data to the Texas Department of Public Safety. With the use of the NIBRS, the Fort Worth Police Department now has the capability to generate reports reflecting a multitude of interrelationships among the collected data — enhancing its ability to analyze crime trends and to implement tactical strategies. NIBRS data is of great value to the City of Fort Worth!

As noted above, in 2011, approximately 44 percent of the reporting agencies throughout the nation were NIBRS certified, and an increasing number of agencies are transitioning to NIBRS. In the meantime, the FBI continues to report UCR data (by extracting UCR data from NIBRS data) until such time as the Uniform Crime Reporting can be discontinued. FBI data is used to identify national and regional crime trends. FBI data is often used for rankings — although the FBI does not recommend this practice — and is often considered the best available information to compare crime from one jurisdiction to another. Since UCR data is available for all reporting agencies nationwide, it is also used for the purpose of making comparisons.

One of Fort Worth’s five Strategic Goals is to become the safest major city in the United States. The FBI data, along with other third-party rankings, are used to determine if we are making progress towards this goal/vision. The Fort Worth Police Department reports both NIBRS data and UCR data so that elected officials, city leaders and the public can review the detailed crime data, and yet still be able to understand (in a very general sense) how Fort Worth compares to peer cities.

1.3 Understanding NIBRS Figures

NIBRS compiles detailed reports on two types of offenses: Group “A” offenses and Group “B” offenses. The two groupings are based on the amount of reporting required for each. Both incidents and arrests are reported for Group “A” offenses, while only arrests are reported for Group “B” offenses.

The following criteria is used to determine whether a crime should be designated as a Group “A” offense:

1. The seriousness or significance of the offense.
2. The frequency or volume of its occurrence.
3. The prevalence of the offense nationwide.
4. The probability of the offense being brought to law enforcement’s attention.
5. The likelihood that law enforcement is the best channel for collecting data regarding the offense.
6. The burden placed on law enforcement in collecting data on the offense.
7. The national statistical validity and usefulness of the collected data.
8. The national UCR Program’s responsibility to make crime data available not only to law enforcement but to others having a legitimate interest in it.

Group “A” offenses are categorized into one of the three following categories: 1) Crimes Against Persons; 2) Crimes Against Property; 3) Crimes Against Society.

- 1) Crimes Against Persons = Scores one offense for each victim
- 2) Crimes Against Property = Scores one offense for each distinct operation
(except Motor Vehicle Theft / one offense is counted per stolen vehicle)
- 3) Crime Against Society = Scores one offense for each violation

NIBRS Group A includes the following 22 Offenses:

- Homicide Offenses
- Sex Offenses, Forcible
- Sex Offenses, Non-forcible
- Robbery
- Assault Offenses
- Burglary / Breaking and Entering
- Larceny / Theft Offenses
- Motor Vehicle Theft
- Arson
- Bribery
- Counterfeiting / Forgery
- Destruction / Damage / Vandalism of Property
- Drug / Narcotic Offenses
- Embezzlement
- Extortion / Blackmail
- Fraud Offenses
- Gambling Offenses
- Kidnapping / Abduction
- Pornography / Obscene Material
- Prostitution Offenses
- Stolen Property Offenses
- Weapon Law Violations

UCR Part I includes the following eight offenses: Criminal Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson.

1.4 Significant Methodology and Definition Differences

A significant difference between NIBRS and UCR Traditional Summary Reporting is that for Crimes Against Persons, NIBRS counts the number of victims, while UCR counts the number of incidents. Consequentially, NIBRS figures tend to show more Crimes Against Persons than UCR figures. In addition, the definitions for Part 1 offenses used in Summary Reporting are different than the offense definitions used by the NIBRS. Section II.

National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS)

Fourth Quarter 2013 Citywide NIBRS Crime Report

2.1 In 2013, NIBRS Group A and B offenses decreased 2.0 percent overall compared to 2012, with decreases in both Crimes Against Persons and Crimes Against Society and a slight increase in Crimes Against Property. In the Fourth Quarter of 2013 compared to the Fourth Quarter of 2012, citywide Group A and B crime decreased 5.2 percent. Crimes Against Persons decreased 7.0 percent overall for the quarter, with decreases in assault offenses, while kidnapping/abduction, murder and forcible sex offenses increased. Crimes Against Property decreased 1.1 percent overall in the Fourth Quarter, with decreases in embezzlement, vandalism of property and fraud.

2.3 Crimes Against Persons (NIBRS - Group A)

Crimes Against Persons decreased 4.9 percent overall in 2013 compared to 2012. All offenses, except murder and forcible sex offenses, decreased between 2012 and 2013.

Crimes Against Persons decreased 7.0 percent overall in the Fourth Quarter, with 2,814 offenses (victims) reported in Fourth Quarter 2013 compared to 3,027 offenses (victims) reported in Fourth Quarter 2012. All assault offenses, including aggravated assaults, decreased between 2012 and 2013, while kidnapping/abduction, murders, and forcible sex offenses increased. Of all the Crimes Against Persons, 48.3 percent were known to be domestic-related.

There were 12 murder and non-negligent manslaughter victims, which reflects an increase of two victims this quarter compared to Fourth Quarter 2012. Seven of the 12 cases have been filed. These murders were the result of a range of motives, including seven arguments, one case of child abuse, one domestic case, and three unknown motives. Eight incidents involved a firearm. There were four homicides in Council District 5; three homicides in Council District 8; two homicides in Council District 4; and, one homicide each in Council Districts 2, 3, and 6. No homicides occurred in Council Districts 7 and 9. In addition, a 1991 cold case was solved in Fourth Quarter 2013. Overall in 2013, murder increased 17.4%, a total of 8 more victims compared to 2012—of which a quadruple murder incident last summer contributes to this overall increase.

Most Crimes Against Persons are simple assaults, defined under NIBRS as an “unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration, or loss of consciousness.” Simple assaults decreased 10.1 percent this quarter, and 54.7 percent of simple assault cases were known to be domestic-related.

The second-largest Crimes Against Persons category is aggravated assaults. Aggravated assaults decreased 9.0 percent in the Fourth Quarter. Approximately 38 percent of the aggravated assaults were domestic-related. Over 53 percent of all aggravated assaults occurred within a residence, 22.5 percent near a roadway, 10.2 percent in a parking lot or parking garage, and 3.3 percent in a bar or night club. A total of 232 aggravated assault arrests were made during the Fourth Quarter of 2013.

Intimidation, another assault offense, is defined as “to unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.” Intimidation offenses decreased 3.3 percent in the Fourth Quarter.

2.3 Crimes Against Persons (NIBRS - Group A) Continued...

Kidnapping/Abduction increased 28.6 percent, with eight more offenses in Fourth Quarter 2013 compared to Fourth Quarter 2012. It is important to understand what is included in this count.

Kidnapping/Abduction is defined by the National Incident Based Reporting System as “the unlawful seizure, transportation, and/or detention of a person against his/her will or of a minor without the consent of his/her custodial parent or legal guardian.”

The Texas Penal Code further divides this definition into four categories: unlawful restraint, kidnapping, aggravated kidnapping, and unlawful transport. Please refer to Texas Penal Code Title 5, Chapter 20 for full definitions, but below are abbreviated definitions of each:


- **Unlawful restraint:** Intentionally or knowingly [restraining] another person.
Restrain: Restrict a person’s movements without consent, so as to interfere substantially with the person’s liberty, by moving the person from one place to another or by confining the person. Restraint without consent is accomplished if by force, intimidation, or deception or any means.
- **Kidnapping:** Intentionally or knowingly [abducting] another person ... not coupled with intent to use or to threaten to use deadly force.
- **Aggravated Kidnapping:** Intentionally or knowingly [abducting] another person with the intent [for example] to hold him for ransom or reward ... use him as a shield or hostage...inflict bodily injury.
- **Unlawful Transport:** For pecuniary benefit [transporting] an individual in a manner that is designed to conceal the individual from ... law enforcement authorities ... and [creating] a substantial likelihood that the individual will suffer serious bodily injury or death.

Of the 36 kidnapping offenses this quarter, there were 30 unlawful restraints, three kidnappings, and three aggravated kidnappings. In approximately 83 percent of all cases, the victim knew the suspect, and 65.1 percent were domestic-related. In 24 cases, the victim was dating or married to the suspect at the time of the incident.

There were 100 forcible rape offenses in the Fourth Quarter of 2013 - representing a 2.0 percent increase from the Fourth Quarter of 2012. Of all forcible rape offenses in the quarter, 69.9 percent were known offender-related. Approximately 41 percent of all victims were 17 years of age or under. There were no known serial offenders for the quarter. The Sex Crimes Unit understands the seriousness of these crimes and continues the investigative process with the goal of bringing perpetrators to justice.

The “Other” forcible sex offense category includes forcible sodomy, sexual assault with an object, and forcible fondling. These offenses increased 25.8 percent this quarter. Approximately 72 percent involved victims 17 years of age or under.

2.4 Crimes Against Property (NIBRS - Group A)

Crimes Against Property decreased 1.1 percent overall, with 11,573 offenses reported in Fourth Quarter 2013 compared to 11,697 in Fourth Quarter 2012. Significant decreases include embezzlement (-19.5 percent), vandalism of property (-15.7 percent), and fraud offenses (-13.0 percent).

Figure 5 - Fourth Quarter 2013, Citywide NIBRS Group A, Crimes Against Property



Motor vehicle theft decreased 6.3 percent this quarter compared to Fourth Quarter 2012. A total of 60 bait car deployments occurred in the Fourth Quarter, and a total of 27 arrests were made for motor vehicle theft.

Burglaries decreased 7.3 percent, with decreases in residential (-7.8 percent), business (-4.7 percent), and other (-6.9 percent) burglaries. Of the 87 repeat locations, 62.1 percent were residences. In the Fourth Quarter of 2013, the Fort Worth Police Department arrested 178 suspects for burglary.

2.5 Crimes Against Society (NIBRS - Group A)

Crimes Against Society offenses are a reflection of the department's enforcement efforts and are counted as one offense per violation. There was a 1.9 percent increase in Crimes Against Society in the Fourth Quarter 2013, of which increased enforcement occurred on gambling (28.6 percent), prostitution (22.2 percent), and weapon law violations (20.9 percent) contributing to the increase.

2.6 Other Offenses (NIBRS - Group B)

Group "B" offenses are reported only when an individual is arrested. A Group "B" arrest report does not include incident data but uses only data elements that describe the arrestee and the circumstances of the arrest. Group "B" offenses decreased 16.9 percent this quarter and decreased 7.2% overall in 2013.

2.7 Gang Unit Report

A total of 82 gang-related incidents occurred in Fourth Quarter 2013 compared to 143 incidents in Fourth Quarter 2012 — a 43 percent decrease.

It should be noted that a single incident may involve multiple offenses. For example, an incident may involve a narcotic violation and an assault offense, which would be documented within one report and then flagged as a gang-related incident. The table below shows the number of offenses within the gang-related incident reports.

What is Gang-Related Crime?

Gang-Related Crime is any criminal act, including but not limited to those involving gang members or gang associates committed for the benefit or furtherance of any criminal gang.

Figure 10 - Gang-Related Offenses By Division




Figure 11 - 2011-2013 Comparison of Citywide Gang-Related Offenses





Figure 12 - Fort Worth City Council District Map

Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Traditional Summary Report

4.1 Fourth Quarter 2013 Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Traditional Summary Report

Uniform Crime Report (UCR) Traditional Summary Reporting is a collective effort on the part of jurisdictions throughout the United States to present a nationwide representation of crime using eight of the most serious and most commonly-reported offenses — Criminal Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft and Arson — collectively known as Part I Offenses. In the Summary Reporting System, the number of criminal incidents are counted, in contrast to the more detailed data collected (using a different methodology) through the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS).

Part I Offenses increased 2.6 percent in Fourth Quarter 2013 compared to Third Quarter 2012. The number of criminal incidents for each Part I crime are presented below:

Quick Note About Reporting Differences

A significant difference between NIBRS and UCR Traditional Summary Reporting is the number of crimes being reported and the methodology used. For example, for Crimes Against Persons, NIBRS counts the number of victims, while UCR counts the number of incidents, which can result in NIBRS figures being higher than UCR figures depending on the number of victims involved in the incidents. In addition, the definitions for Part 1 offenses used in Summary Reporting are different than the offense definitions used by the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS). The Fort Worth Police Department submits NIBRS data to the Texas Department of Public Safety (TXDPS), which is then submitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). The FBI then converts the NIBRS data into the UCR Traditional Summary Reporting for publication in the annual *Crime in the United States* publication. Since this report is based on snapshot data queried on January 30, 2014, data queried before or after this date may vary from this report.

Section V.

Department Initiatives Update

Code Blue at the School Finds Success at First Ten Schools

In partnership with the Fort Worth Independent School District (FWISD), FWPD launched the Code Blue at the School Program in ten elementary schools. Started as a response to the Sandy Hook tragedy, this program utilizes volunteers to patrol the perimeter of elementary schools as extra eyes and ears, to enhance the level of security.

The ten elementary schools include Bonnie Brae, Cesar Chavez, East Handley, West Handley, North Hi Mount, Rosemont, Hazel Harvey Peace, Western Hills, and Charles Nash.

Part of the success behind this program is the true partnership between FWISD and FWPD. Neighborhood Patrol Officers train the volunteers on what to do and what to look for around schools. The school principals work with their Parent Teacher Associations (PTAs) and parent liaisons to help solicit volunteers. Additionally, the police department provides a communication radio and the schools provide walkie talkies. In July 2013, the Police Department hired a new staff person to coordinate all Code Blue volunteer programs including Code Blue at the Schools. The position is funded with Crime Control and Prevention District funds.



The commitment of volunteers is another part of the program's success. More than 40 volunteers are passionate about keeping the children safe and following the guidelines of the program.

New Mobile Data Computers Installed in Over 700 Patrol Units

To comply with Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) requirements for mobile data devices, the FWPD formed a project team to review the requirements and assess the needs of the department, including Mobile Data Computers (MDCs) that are installed in each patrol vehicle. The project team consisted of representatives from FWPD's Fleet Division, Data Management Unit, and Communications Division, as well as, City of Fort Worth Information Technology staff.

The team reviewed MDC devices from five different vendors, and chose the CDW Corporation as the company to provide Getac devices to the department. The MDCs and related software and hardware were purchased using Crime Control and Prevention District (CCPD) funds.




From December 2012 through July 2013, the project team designed and prepared the systems for installation in patrol units. The Fleet Unit began installation in late July 2013 and successfully deployed over 700 devices by October 2013.

The MDCs, which are connected to the City network and utilize internal AT&T card slots and built-in global positioning system (GPS) devices, provide field personnel with a stable and powerful tool for data-driven policing. Field personnel now have the capability to reliably access data mining portals and state databases and utilize numerous internet and intranet web sites in an effort to retrieve the necessary information to solve crimes, arrest criminals, and keep them off our streets.

Power DMS Assists with Police Communications Training

Police Communications went live with the Power Document Management System (DMS) during the fourth quarter of 2013. This product was purchased with Tarrant County 9-1-1 Public Safety Answering Points (PSAP) Assistance Funds.

The Power DMS system implementation enables Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) to be stored and distributed electronically to Police Communications employees. The software package includes an electronic signature capture and provides opportunities to require employees to review training material and take online tests to verify competency and understanding.



The Police Communications Division is currently seeking a Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) Accreditation for its 9-1-1 center, which requires significant reorganization and development of SOPs and sets standards for call taker and dispatcher training that were difficult to meet by manually maintaining those procedures. With Power DMS, the Communications Division will be able to achieve these accreditation requirements.

Supervisory and managerial staff can review progress on training assignments and verify their employees' signatures for documents and successful completion of trainings. Power DMS will help with employee evaluation and setting goals and standards for performance, by furthering divisional and departmental goals of providing effective and efficient service to the citizens of Fort Worth.

Class 134 Graduates from Academy

During the 4th Quarter, Recruit Class 134 graduated from the Police Training Academy on December 13, 2014—putting 26 more officers on the streets of Fort Worth.



FYPD Gives to Cowboy Santa in a Grand Way

In just two short months, FYPD employees collected over \$6,700 for the Cowboy Santa Program and donated 1,000 toys for deserving children, as well as, 800 items for senior citizens.

Captain Linda Stuart and her Community Programs Division worked diligently to develop a fundraising plan that would not only surpass their original fundraising goal of \$3,000, but more than doubled it. The three main components of the plan included:

1. \$5 Jeans and Jerseys Days.
2. FYPD Indoor Golf Putting Tournament
3. BBQ Holiday Luncheon
