**SUBJECT: PROPOSED ZONING ORDINANCE TEXT AMENDMENTS FOR THE R1 AND R2 RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS AND MINI-WAREHOUSES IN G AND I DISTRICTS**

This report provides information concerning proposed text amendments to the Zoning Ordinance, which are intended to reduce the need for PD Planned Development zoning and for variances.

**R1 and R2 Residential Districts**

Residential developers have requested that the City's zoning classifications be modified to allow narrower single-family lots with smaller side yard setbacks for detached single-family homes. This type of product is first allowed in the R1 Zero Lotline/Cluster district. Staff is proposing to reduce the minimum lot area, lot width, and side yard requirements in R1 to address market demand.

In the R2 Townhouse/Cluster district, staff is proposing to increase the maximum density from 12 to 24 units per acre and to change the size of a building row to a maximum face length of 250 feet. In both the R1 and R2 districts, existing supplemental development standards will be moved from Section 6.503 into the individual R1 and R2 sections.

**Mini-Warehouses**

In 2006, the Zoning Ordinance was amended to allow mini-warehouses by right only in the J Medium Industrial and K Heavy Industrial districts and by PD Planned Development in all other districts. The Zoning Commission and a local mini-warehouse developer have requested that mini-warehouses be allowed by right in G Intensive Commercial and I Light Industrial zoning districts. The proposed amendments would apply a four-story height limit and façade and other development standards in commercial districts and in all industrial districts when in proximity to one or two family zoning districts.

These proposed amendments have been presented to the Development Advisory Committee and the Zoning Commission. Below is the proposed schedule of public hearings.

**WHEREAS**, Texas Christian University (the "Borrower") is seeking to refinance bonds issued to finance improvements to the campus of the Borrower, which is located at 2800 S. University Blvd., Fort Worth, Texas; and

**WHEREAS**, the Borrower has requested that the Issuer issue bonds or other obligations to refinance the outstanding Red River Education Finance Corporation Higher Education Revenue Bonds (Texas Christian University Project) Series 2005 and Red River Education Finance Corporation Higher Education Revenue Bonds (Texas Christian University Project) Series 2006 (collectively, the "Refunded Bonds"), in one or more series in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$54,000,000 (the "Refunding Bonds"); and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to the provisions of section 147(f) of Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), the City Council of the City of Fort Worth, after a public hearing following reasonable notice (the "TEFRA Hearing"), must approve issuance of bonds or other obligations by the Issuer to enable the Refunding Bonds to qualify as tax-exempt obligations under the Code;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FORT WORTH, TEXAS:**

**SECTION 1.** That the City Council, solely for the purposes of section 147(f) of the Code, as the elected legislative body having jurisdiction over the area in which the facilities proposed to be financed are located, hereby approves the proposed issuance of the Refunding Bonds by the Issuer to refinance the Refunded Bonds for the benefit of the Borrower, in an amount not to exceed \$54,000,000.

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**DISCLAIMER:** This report provides a snapshot of the Fort Worth Police Department's National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) data that was queried from the Records Management System (RMS) on January 15, 2015. The Department's RMS is updated regularly based on ongoing investigations. The data in this snapshot has been reviewed and certified by the Texas Department of Public Safety. Since this is a snapshot, data queried before or after this date is apt to change and may vary from other reports.

# **Section I.**

## **Understanding Crime Reporting**

## **1.1 National Perspective on Reporting Crime: Transitioning from Uniform Crime Reporting to National Incident-Based Reporting System**

According to the National Incident-Based Reporting System, Volume 1: Data Collection Guidelines, by the U.S. Department of Justice,

“Since the establishment of the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program in 1930, the volume, diversity, and complexity of crime steadily increased while the UCR Program remained virtually unchanged. Recognizing the need to address crime’s growing challenge, the law enforcement community in the late 1970s called for a thorough study of the UCR Program with the objective of revising the Program to meet law enforcement’s needs into the twenty-first century. The National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) is the result of that study.”

In January 1989, the FBI began accepting NIBRS data from a handful of agencies. As more contributing law enforcement agencies learn about the rich data available through incident-based reporting (and as resources permit), more agencies are implementing the NIBRS. Although participation in NIBRS is purely voluntary, about 43 percent of all law enforcement agencies were NIBRS certified as of June 2012 (based on that year’s data submissions). Until an agency becomes certified, it continues to submit data in accordance with the requirements of the traditional UCR Program. Because the transition to the new system will take considerable time, the national UCR Program will continue to collect, process, and publish traditional UCR data. This is accomplished by collecting data in the old format from agencies not participating in NIBRS and by extracting traditional summary data from the more comprehensive submissions of agencies participating in NIBRS.

The result is a continuation of the traditional statistical time series and a gradual phase-in of the newer forms of statistics made possible by NIBRS. This parallel operation of the old and new systems will be maintained until it is determined that the old system can be discontinued.

## **1.2 Fort Worth’s Crime Report**

Fort Worth understands the importance of collecting and reporting detailed, accurate, and meaningful incident-based data. In January 2006, Fort Worth was certified to participate in the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) and began reporting NIBRS data to the Texas Department of Public Safety. With the use of the NIBRS, the Fort Worth Police Department now has the capability to generate reports reflecting a multitude of interrelationships among the collected data — enhancing its ability to analyze crime trends and to implement tactical strategies. NIBRS data is of great value to the City of Fort Worth!

As noted above, in 2012, approximately 43 percent of the reporting agencies throughout the nation were NIBRS certified, and an increasing number of agencies are transitioning to NIBRS. In the meantime, the FBI continues to report UCR data (by extracting UCR data from NIBRS data) until such time as the Uniform Crime Reporting can be discontinued. FBI data is used to identify national and regional crime trends. FBI data is often used for rankings — although the FBI does not recommend this practice — and is often considered the best available information to compare crime from one jurisdiction to another. Since UCR data is available for all reporting agencies nationwide, it is also used for the purpose of making comparisons.

One of Fort Worth’s five Strategic Goals is to become the safest major city in the United States. The FBI data, along with other third-party rankings, are used to determine if we are making progress towards this goal/vision. The Fort Worth Police Department reports both NIBRS data and UCR data so that elected officials, city leaders and the public can review the detailed crime data, and yet still be able to understand (in a very general sense) how Fort Worth compares to peer cities.

### 1.3 Understanding NIBRS Figures

NIBRS compiles detailed reports on two types of offenses: Group “A” offenses and Group “B” offenses. The two groupings are based on the amount of reporting required for each. Both incidents and arrests are reported for Group “A” offenses, while only arrests are reported for Group “B” offenses.

The following criteria is used to determine whether a crime should be designated as a Group “A” offense:

1. The seriousness or significance of the offense.
2. The frequency or volume of its occurrence.
3. The prevalence of the offense nationwide.
4. The probability of the offense being brought to law enforcement’s attention.
5. The likelihood that law enforcement is the best channel for collecting data regarding the offense.
6. The burden placed on law enforcement in collecting data on the offense.
7. The national statistical validity and usefulness of the collected data.
8. The national UCR Program’s responsibility to make crime data available not only to law enforcement but to others having a legitimate interest in it.

Group “A” offenses are categorized into one of the three following categories: 1) Crimes Against Persons; 2) Crimes Against Property; 3) Crimes Against Society.

- 1) Crimes Against Persons = Scores one offense for each victim
- 2) Crimes Against Property = Scores one offense for each distinct operation  
(except Motor Vehicle Theft / one offense is counted per stolen vehicle)
- 3) Crime Against Society = Scores one offense for each violation

- Human Trafficking
- Destruction / Damage / Vandalism of Property
- Drug / Narcotic Offenses
- Embezzlement
- Extortion / Blackmail

- Pornography / Obscene Material
- Prostitution Offenses
- Stolen Property Offenses
- Weapon Law Violations

UCR Part I includes the following eight offenses: Criminal Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson.

### 1.4 Significant Methodology and Definition Differences

A significant difference between NIBRS and UCR Traditional Summary Reporting is that for Crimes Against Persons, NIBRS counts the number of victims, while UCR counts the number of incidents. Consequentially, NIBRS figures tend to show more Crimes Against Persons than UCR figures. In addition, the definitions for Part 1 offenses used in Summary Reporting are different than the offense definitions used by the NIBRS. # **National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS)**

## Third Quarter 2014 Citywide NIBRS Crime Report

2.1 Overall, citywide Group A and B crime decreased 1.1 percent in the Third Quarter of 2014. Crimes Against Persons increased 3.4 percent overall. Murder, non-negligent manslaughter, and negligent manslaughter decreased 55.6 percent, while forcible sex offenses increased 14.4%. Crimes Against Property decreased 2.8 percent overall. Between January and September, cumulative NIBRS Group A and B offenses decreased 4.9 percent from 2013 to 2014.

The following table provides a comprehensive list of Fort Worth's citywide NIBRS Group A offenses by Crimes Against Persons, Crimes Against Property, and Crimes Against Society. These trends and enforcement efforts are explained in greater detail throughout this report.

### 2.3 Crimes Against Persons (NIBRS - Group A)

Crimes Against Persons increased 3.4 percent overall in the Third Quarter of 2014, with 3,360 offenses (victims) reported, compared to 3,251 offenses (victims) reported in the Third Quarter of 2013. Murder/non-negligent manslaughter and negligent manslaughter offenses decreased 55.6% while forcible sex offenses increased 14.4% overall. Of all the Crimes Against Persons in the Third Quarter 2014, 51 percent were known to be domestic-related.

Between January and September, the number of Crimes Against Persons offenses stayed relatively the same between 2013 to 2014.

In Third Quarter 2014, there were eight homicide victims, which is a decrease of ten total victims from Third Quarter 2013. These homicides were the result of a range of motives, including four arguments, two domestic cases, two robbery cases, and six incidents involving a firearm. Seven of the eight cases have been filed. There were three homicides each in Council Districts 2 and 3, and two homicides in Council District 8.

Most Crimes Against Persons are simple assaults, defined under NIBRS as an “unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration, or loss of consciousness.” Simple assaults increased 1.7 percent in Third Quarter 2014 compared to Third Quarter 2013, and 57.7 percent of simple assault cases were known to be domestic-related.

The second-largest Crimes Against Persons category is aggravated assaults. Aggravated assaults increased 5.1 percent in Third Quarter 2014 compared to Third Quarter 2013. Approximately 39.6 percent of aggravated assaults were known to be domestic-related. Nearly 55 percent of all aggravated assaults occurred within a residence, 23.4 percent near a roadway, 6.8 percent in a parking lot or parking garage, and four percent in a bar or night club.

Intimidation, another assault offense, is defined as “to unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.” Intimidation offenses increased 3.4 percent from Third Quarter 2013 to Third Quarter 2014.

### 2.3 Crimes Against Persons (NIBRS - Group A) Continued...

Kidnapping/Abduction increased 5.3 percent, with two additional offenses in Third Quarter 2014 compared to Third Quarter 2013. It is important to understand what is included in this count.

**Kidnapping/Abduction** is defined by the National Incident Based Reporting System as “the unlawful seizure, transportation, and/or detention of a person against his/her will or of a minor without the consent of his/her custodial parent or legal guardian.”

The Texas Penal Code further divides this definition into four categories: unlawful restraint, kidnapping, aggravated kidnapping, and unlawful transport. Please refer to Texas Penal Code Title 5, Chapter 20 for full definitions, but below are abbreviated definitions of each:


- **Unlawful restraint:** Intentionally or knowingly [restraining] another person.  
*Restrain: Restrict a person’s movements without consent, so as to interfere substantially with the person’s liberty, by moving the person from one place to another or by confining the person. Restraint without consent is accomplished if by force, intimidation, or deception or any means.*
- **Kidnapping:** Intentionally or knowingly [abducting] another person ... not coupled with intent to use or to threaten to use deadly force.
- **Aggravated Kidnapping:** Intentionally or knowingly [abducting] another person with the intent [for example] to hold him for ransom or reward ... use him as a shield or hostage...inflict bodily injury.
- **Unlawful Transport:** For pecuniary benefit [transporting] an individual in a manner that is designed to conceal the individual from ... law enforcement authorities ... and [creating] a substantial likelihood that the individual will suffer serious bodily injury or death.

Of the 40 kidnapping offenses this quarter, approximately 56 percent were unlawful restraints, 24 percent were kidnappings, and 20 percent were aggravated kidnappings. In 77.6 percent of all cases, the victim knew the suspect, 64 percent were known to be domestic-related, and, in 28.4 percent of the cases, the victim was dating or married to the suspect at the time of the incident.

There were 114 forcible sex offenses in Third Quarter 2014, which is a five percent decrease compared to Third Quarter 2013. Of all forcible sex offenses, approximately 59 percent were known offender-related, and 41 percent of all victims were 17 years of age or under. The Sex Crimes Unit has identified one serial offender for multiple forcible sex offenses and continues the investigative process with the goal of bringing all perpetrators to justice.

The “Other” forcible sex offense category includes forcible sodomy, sexual assault with an object, and forcible fondling. These offenses increased 30.8 percent in Third Quarter 2014. Approximately 76 percent involved victims 17 years of age or under.

## 2.4 Crimes Against Property (NIBRS - Group A)

Crimes Against Property decreased 2.8 percent overall, with 11,100 offenses reported in Third Quarter 2014 compared to 11,422 in Third Quarter 2013. Counterfeiting/forgery offenses decreased 20.5%, arson offenses decreased 18%, and robbery offenses decreased 11.5 percent while embezzlement offenses increased 45.1 percent and thefts from motor vehicles increased 11.2 percent.

**Figure 5 - Third Quarter 2014, Citywide NIBRS Group A, Crimes Against Property**



Motor vehicle theft decreased 1.6 percent this quarter compared to Third Quarter 2013.

Burglaries decreased seven percent, with decreases in residential (-2.3 percent), business (-27 percent), and other (-8.9 percent) burglaries. Of the 69 repeat locations, 53.6 percent were residences. In Third Quarter 2014, the Fort Worth Police Department arrested 170 suspects for burglary.

## 2.5 Crimes Against Society (NIBRS - Group A)

Crimes Against Society offenses are a reflection of the department's enforcement efforts and are counted as one offense per violation. There was an 8.9 percent increase in Crimes Against Society in Third Quarter 2014. Pornography/obscene material offenses, gambling offenses, and weapon law violations all decreased between Third Quarter 2013 and Third Quarter 2014, while prostitution increased 218.4 and drug/narcotic violations increased 4.7 percent.

## 2.6 Other Offenses (NIBRS - Group B)

Group "B" offenses are reported only when an individual is arrested. A Group "B" arrest report does not include incident data but uses only data elements that describe the arrestee and the circumstances of the arrest. Group "B" offenses decreased 2.9 percent in Third Quarter 2014 compared to Third Quarter 2013.

## 2.7 Gang Unit Report

A total of 113 gang-related incidents occurred in the Third Quarter of 2014 compared to 136 incidents in the Third Quarter of 2013 — a 16.9 percent decrease. The total number of gang-related offenses decreased 18.7% in the Third Quarter of 2014 compared to the Third Quarter of 2013.

It should be noted that a single incident may involve multiple offenses. For example, an incident may involve a narcotic violation and an assault offense, which would be documented within one report and then flagged as a gang-related incident.


### What is Gang-Related Crime?

*Gang-Related Crime* is any criminal act, including but not limited to those involving gang members or gang associates committed for the benefit or furtherance of any criminal gang.

**Figure 11 - 2012 - 2014 Comparison of Citywide Gang-Related Offenses**





Figure 12 - Fort Worth City Council District Map






# **Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Traditional Summary Report**

#### 4.1 Third Quarter 2014 Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Traditional Summary Report

Uniform Crime Report (UCR) Traditional Summary Reporting is a collective effort on the part of jurisdictions throughout the United States to present a nationwide representation of crime using eight of the most serious and most commonly-reported offenses — Criminal Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft and Arson — collectively known as Part I Offenses. In the Summary Reporting System, the number of criminal incidents are counted, in contrast to the more detailed data collected (using a different methodology) through the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS).

Part I Offenses decreased 1.7 percent in Third Quarter 2014 compared to Third Quarter 2013. The number of criminal incidents for each Part I crime are presented below:

#### Quick Note About Reporting Differences

A significant difference between NIBRS and UCR Traditional Summary Reporting is the number of crimes being reported and the methodology used. For example, for Crimes Against Persons, NIBRS counts the number of victims, while UCR counts the number of incidents, which can result in NIBRS figures being higher than UCR figures depending on the number of victims involved in the incidents. In addition, the definitions for Part 1 offenses used in Summary Reporting are different than the offense definitions used by the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS). The Fort Worth Police Department submits NIBRS data to the Texas Department of Public Safety (TxDPS), which is then submitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). The FBI then converts the NIBRS data into the UCR Traditional Summary Reporting for publication in the annual *Crime in the United States* publication. Since this report is based on snapshot data queried on January 15, 2015, data queried before or after this date may vary from this report.

# **Department Initiatives Update**

## COPS Hiring Grant Awarded to FWPD

The Fort Worth Police Department was awarded a Community Oriented Policing Services grant in September. The Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) Hiring Program is designed to advance public safety through community policing by addressing full-time sworn officer needs of law enforcement agencies nationwide. The federal grant program provides funds directly to law enforcement agencies to hire new and/or rehire veteran law enforcement officers to increase the agencies' community policing capacities and crime prevention efforts. The grant will provide funding to hire 15 additional officers.



Through the COPS Hiring Program, five officer positions will be created to staff a Real Time Crime Center (RTCC), which will be a state-of-the-art operation focused on crime reduction and counter-terrorism activities throughout the state. Operated 24 hours a day/7 days a week, the RTCC's primary role will be to assist police officers by providing real-time reports, information, support, tips, leads, and monitoring, thereby delivering a proactive approach to law enforcement in developing and dynamic situations. The RTCC will also conduct supplemental investigative work, providing data mining support to detectives in complex cases, especially cold cases where additional in-depth research may find clues not available by other means.

Ten positions will support a sixth Zero Tolerance (ZT) team, an identified need due to population and city growth. The ZT Section, in the Tactical Operations Division, currently consists of five teams, each containing eight officers, one detective/corporal, and one sergeant. The ZT Section provides crime suppression support to other FWPD units and other agencies based on intelligence-led policing strategies. In instances of high-risk, dynamic situations and special events, ZT teams will work closely with the RTCC, creating increased intelligence capacity and information-sharing flowing from the RTCC centralized hub to the field and back.

## South Division NPOs Aid Grieving Family

In August, a fire swept through a home in a South Division neighborhood, killing a child and devastating the family. Several South Division Neighborhood Patrol Officers (NPOs) requested donations from Police Officer Associations and Citizens on Patrol, and received donations of furniture, household goods, clothing, and toys from a variety of sources. The response was so substantial, the donations filled an entire trailer. In addition to the donated items, several hundred dollars was collected for the family's surviving children to purchase clothing for the upcoming school year.

## Kamper Promoted to Deputy Chief

Captain Kamper was promoted to Deputy Chief at a ceremony held on September 22. Formerly the commander of Central Division, Deputy Chief Kamper now oversees the Department's Operational Command, that includes Internal Affairs, Property and Records Management, and the Fleet/Auto Pound Division.



## Facility Construction Updates

### Public Safety Training Center

Construction on the new Public Safety Training Center (PSTC) continues with the Weapons Range opening in November 2014. The remainder of the training center including the administration building is scheduled to be operational in April 2015. The PSTC will further enhance the department's ability to utilize its community and intelligence-led policing philosophies by training new and current officers in a modern environment equipped with state-of-the-art technology.

### Heliport

A new heliport is currently under construction at Meacham International Airport that will replace the existing, substandard structure with a modern, efficient facility. The new facility will house FWPDP's two helicopters and includes a third hangar bay for future growth. Construction is expected to be complete in June 2015.


### Mounted Patrol

Construction on a new Mounted Patrol Facility in west Fort Worth near Loop 820 and Las Vegas Trail began in June 2014 and is expected to be complete in December 2014. The new facility is funded with private donations from the Citizens Support Group for the Fort Worth Mounted Patrol. The existing facility near the Fort Worth Stockyards is more than 25 years old, lacks restroom and locker room facilities and has inadequate storage and office areas. Since this facility was originally built, the size of the Mounted Patrol Unit has more than doubled, and although temporary stalls were added to house the additional animals, the current site does not provide sufficient exercise or turn-out areas for the animals. Construction of the new larger facility will provide sufficient office space, stalls, and exercise areas for Fort Worth's Mounted Patrol.



## FWPD Social Media Expansion

Since late 2013, followers on FWPD social media sites, including Twitter and Facebook, have increased significantly. One



of the Public Relations Office's (PRO) responsibilities is to respond to residents using social media. With the growing number of social media followers, the PRO needed help responding to the numerous messages it receives through the Department's social media sites. PRO signed up for Social Media Capture (SMC4), a free social media monitoring tool, which sends the entire PRO team automated alerts (i.e., threats, compliments, profanity, negative comments) in order to respond quickly and stay vigilant of all communication the Department's social media sites receive. SMC4 has proven itself a successful tool in the Department's continued communication with residents and social media followers.
