She pointed out that Fort Worth raised more than \$545,000.00 last year and the need for service would continue to increase each year. She requested that Mayor Pro tem Zimmerman don the “red apron” and ring the bell.

Mayor Pro tem Zimmerman placed the first donation from Fort Worth in the kettle. He stated that there were 11,000 angels remaining to be adopted on the angel trees and encouraged the citizens to go out and adopt an angel in need.

He further stated that the awards would be presented on March 6, 2012, and that the applications could be completed on the City’s website or the citizens could call the District 9 office at 817-392-8809, for more information.

Council Member Scarth announced that Score a Goal in the Classroom would sponsor the Western Heritage Day event at 12:00 p.m. on January 14, 2012, located at the old Tandy Center Parking Garage on Belknap Street. He stated that there would be music groups from multiple schools and other groups performing. He encouraged the citizens to attend after the Stock Show parade.

Council Member Shingleton announced that in Tarrant County seven (7) out of 10 people with Dementia lived at home and that 75% of their care was provided by family and friends. He stated that the James L. West Alzheimer Center, located at 1111 Summit Avenue, created two (2) new educational programs, a comprehensive caregiver training and taking action on Alzheimer’s disease, to help support the families. He further stated that the programs were designed to give the community a better understanding of Alzheimer’s disease and Dementia. They further stated that Ms. Cantu would include off-street parking located in the empty lots so that there would be no parking on the street. They advised that City staff had developed a plan to have the property zoned single-family with special use for the beauty salon and if Ms. Cantu failed to continue operating as a beauty salon the property would automatically return to single-family use. They also stated that they felt the beauty salon would be beneficial to the community and that there would be no outside signs or lights to disturb the neighbors.

Council Member Espino expressed appreciation to the citizens for attending the meeting. He stated that there were strong points on both sides of the issue. He added that originally the application was for "E" Neighborhood Commercial and that the Zoning Commission had denied their request. He further stated that he had sent this item back to the Zoning Commission hoping that both parties would reach an agreement on the use of the property, but the Zoning Commission had rejected the proposal again. He advised that the neighborhoods had been rezoned to protect the historical integrity and that he would defer to the overlaying principal of zoning land use and the principal of encroachment. He further advised that the residents on Clinton Avenue had made a compelling argument and that he would agree that the use was not compatible with the land use surrounding the neighborhood, which was residential and not consistent with the Comprehensive Plan. He added that he believed they could find a better suited lot for the beauty shop in the Northside area and that he was going to uphold the Zoning Commission's recommendation for denial.

To be developed under the "E" Neighborhood Commercial development standards, site plan required to: Amend "PD-707" to Planned Development/Specific use for gas line compressor station only, site plan included. (Recommended for Denial)

Council Member Scarth stated that it was his intent to propose that the Council uphold the recommendation to deny Zoning Docket No. ZC-11-098 without prejudice. He added that he wanted to give some explanation to the citizens who were requesting that this case be denied with prejudice. He stated that he did not see a material difference if the zoning case came back before Council without neighborhood support and would not find a different result from the Zoning Commission. He added that he did not see any real risk if they brought this case back after 12 months and pointed out that the applicant would not get a different result unless there was a significant change in the way the neighborhoods felt about the location. He cautioned that it was possible that the applicant could find a location where they could correctly build the facility without the necessity of obtaining the approval from the Zoning Commission or the City Council and that the citizens may not be happy with the new proposed location.

Mr. Justin Bond, representing Texas Midstream Gas Services, 100 Energy Way, appeared before Council in support of Zoning Docket No. ZC-11-098 and requested this application be denied without prejudice. He stated to satisfy additional compressor needs, the company would be hiring Freese and Nichols to help explore alternative sites. He further stated the company was committed to finding a solution that would benefit the leaseholders who expected maximum production and royalties from the wells. He pointed out that City staff had reviewed this application and concluded that the site was inconsistent with City policies and added that the gas well ordinance and discussions by City leaders indicated otherwise.

The following individuals appeared before Council in opposition to Zoning Docket No. ZC-11-098 and requested the City Council uphold the Zoning Commission's recommendation to deny Zoning Docket No. ZC-11-098 with prejudice. They advised that the residents purchased their homes with the thought of having a quiet neighborhood but were now being threatened with a noisy compressor station in the area. They stated that the Zoning Commission agreed that the compressor station was not consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan for the east side of Fort Worth. They further stated that the Zoning Commission recognized the tremendous opposition by concerned neighbors and had reprimanded Chesapeake for blatant safety violations that were presented to them. They advised that approximately 75% of the 2,000 citizens in the area had signed petitions expressing their opposition to this request. They further advised that they were concerned with the emissions from the compressor station and other industrial equipment, especially for individuals with chronic health issues. They also pointed out that drawings for the compressor station had not been presented for review and that they were not told how many compressors would be built on the site.

Council Member Jordan clarified that the City Council had to consider the rights of both the neighborhoods and the mineral rights owners and that there were certain laws that must be followed as this was a zoning case not a drilling case.

Council Member Scarth stated that there were a number of complexities regarding this case and that there was the entire subject of takings if the City of Fort Worth created a situation where mineral owners could not harvest their own property and that the City and the taxpayers could be liable. He advised that the property owners had the right to develop their land if it was within the guidelines and a compatible use. He pointed out that the park near Mallard Cove would not be developed today with walking trails and picnic tables if not for the money received from the pipelines. He stated that the citizens made it clear that they wanted the zoning case denied with prejudice and that he was prepared to consider making that motion.

Council Members Jordan, Espino, Shingleton and Mayor Pro tem Zimmerman all expressed their appreciation to Council Member Scarth for his due diligence and his leadership on this zoning case. They also expressed their appreciation to the citizens attending the meeting and spoke passionately on the subject. They stated that there was a difference between a gas well and compressor station and that they would continue to seek additional control on the compressor stations. They pointed out that they would continue to look at amendments to the gas drilling ordinance so that the quality of life would be protected in the neighborhoods. They advised that because gas drilling was an economic engine they would support drilling but they would not support encroachments into the neighborhoods and added they would support the motion to deny with prejudice.

Council Member Jordan stated that although he normally abstained from voting on cases involving Chesapeake Operating, Inc., this was a zoning matter and he was advised by the City Attorney that a conflict of interest did not exist.

He requested that within two (2) years the Council take another look at the ordinance and reconvene a select few of the multi-family housing owners to review how the ordinance was working in the community.

Mayor Pro tem Zimmerman stated that there were concerns about the ordinance, but they were looking for support from the landlords to help determine what other actions needed to be taken.

Council Member Burns stated that the modifications to the multi-family ordinance applied to either apartment complexes of three (3) or more and eight (8) or more units. He stated that it did not include duplexes. He clarified that the crime free addendum only needed to be used on the lease if the landlord did not use the standardized leases. He stated that the residents of the substandard apartments needed this ordinance to protect them. He also advised that the local realtors and other organizations supported these changes.

Mr. Abraham Rivera, 1435 Maddox Street, appeared before Council and stated that he lost his investment properties because of citations that he had received from the Code Compliance Department. He stated that he felt he deserved respect from the Judge when he attended court and requested the Council establish guidelines for the judges and prosecutors to ensure that citizens received the respect they deserved. He also requested that the Council prepare a schedule of fees for the Code Compliance Department to distribute when citations were issued.

Mayor Pro tem Zimmerman referred Mr. Rivera to Mr. Brandon Bennett, Director, Code Compliance Department, for resolution.

Ms. Trinity Kilmurray, 4058 Meadowbrook Drive, appeared before Council in support of Occupy Fort Worth and stated that she wanted to let the Council and Chief Halstead, Chief of Police, know that she had been assaulted on numerous occasions by the Police while she was

“occupying”. She stated that she was told by Officers and an attorney that she was supposed to tell the Police that she had a seizure disorder so that they would not flash lights in her eyes. She further stated that the assault caused her to have a seizure and she lost her job. She stated that several other officers also assaulted the occupiers and added that an occupier had been assaulted by another person at the assembly and the officers did not intervene.

Mr. Paul Mitchell, 100 Red Bird Lane, appeared before Council and stated that his problems started with a scofflaw letter from the City of Fort Worth and that two (2) other drivers in his company had received the same letters. He stated that when he tried to resolve the matter he was unable to do so due to an administration error. He further stated that he received another letter relative to this matter but it was for the wrong vehicle. He pointed out that the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles had given him his registration but they were under another person. He stated that when he took everything to court to show that he had taken care of everything, the City of Fort Worth would not refund his money for the mistake they made. He stated that he spoke to Doug Black, Assistant City Attorney, and he conducted an investigation and stated that he and another female had the same P.O. Box number and this was the reason why she received his scofflaw letter instead of a release on his vehicle. He advised that because of this issue he had received 10 tickets for non-registration. He stated that the District Attorney had told him that the City of Fort Worth had made a mistake and he requested to be reimbursed for \$1,070.00.

Mayor Pro tem Zimmerman referred Mr. Mitchell to Mr. Charles Daniels, Assistant City Manager, for resolution.

There being no further business, Mayor Pro tem adjourned the meeting at 10:16 p.m., in memory of Mr. William P. Crazz, Jr., a respected and influential leader in the community and devoted family man, who passed away on November 19, 2011.



SUBJECT: December 2011 – Sales Tax Update

In response to the volatile nature of sales tax revenue, the Staff is committed to providing you a brief update of the sales tax collections. The Texas Comptroller's Office posted results on December 7th. The results are dependent upon the timeliness and accuracy of sales tax payers' returns. This payment from the State represents taxes collected on sales that occurred primarily in the month of October. In this report, you will see Fort Worth's sales tax collection compared to last year and the impact on the current year's budget.

MONTHLY SALES TAX COLLECTIONS FOR OCTOBER



Note: City's net payment for sales tax collections was down (\$157,742) or (2.04%) compared to this month last year. However, as depicted in the table below, the City experienced \$451,884 or 5.99% in positive growth when compared to last year's month-to-month current period collections. Texas Comptroller Susan Combs reported on December 7 that statewide collections for October were \$2.07 billion. This is a new record and only the second month in history when collections have exceeded \$2 billion. It previously occurred in the summer of 2008, just before the recession. This positive trend has continued in Fort Worth's current period collections.

The adjustment between the current collections and net collections unfortunately is a result of a significant audit adjustment in October. Audits of a company based in the City of Plano revealed the company paid sales tax to the cities where goods were delivered rather than to the city of origin. As a result of this audit, several Metroplex cities had significant audit reductions, while the City of Plano had a large increase in audit collections. The table below highlights cities with large adjustments this month related to the audit.

The purpose of this report is to provide the City Council with results from Comprehensive Plan community meetings held this fall (See Exhibit A), as well as to identify proposed substantive revisions (See Exhibit B) to the Draft 2012 Comprehensive Plan.

Since September, City staff has met with 155 people during five meetings. At the meetings with Leadership Fort Worth and the Young Leaders Council of the Greater Fort Worth Real Estate Council, staff conducted a visioning exercise with strong participation from these groups. In February 2012, staff will conduct a similar visioning exercise with young leaders participating in SteerFW. Staff will record the results of these meetings and comments from the City Plan Commission for a future vision discussion with the City Council.

The Planning and Development Department encourages public participation in the Comprehensive Plan update process by distributing newsletter articles by email to community organizations; publishing articles in City News, Facebook, and Twitter; and posting update information and the draft plan on the City's website. Staff meets individually with interested business organizations and neighborhood associations at their request.

Staff also held three annexation meetings in Far North Fort Worth where more than 100 citizens were briefed on the annexation program for their area. Approximately 75 people attended the meeting for areas in District 2 and District 7. The comments ranged from strong objections to minor concerns about being annexed. Attendees asked questions about the process and how they would be affected upon annexation. The City Council will consider four of the areas for annexation in 2012. Five people attended a special meeting for Area 18 in District 2, which the City Council agreed to consider for annexation in 2014. Attendees expressed some concern about being annexed, but mainly asked questions about the process and how they would be affected.

The next steps in the update process include a public hearing on January 25 with the City Plan Commission followed by a public hearing with the City Council on February 14. Staff will ask the City Council to adopt the 2012 Comprehensive Plan on February 28.

The Comprehensive Plan is fully updated biennially to incorporate the most current data available. Various goals, objectives, policies and strategies are refined based on comments from City Council, City departments, cooperating agencies, and citizens. Appendix C: Future Land Use By Sector is updated in response to land use changes, zoning decisions, and other factors. Appendices D and E are updated to add new capital improvement projects and to delete completed or cancelled projects.

The 2012 Comprehensive Plan reflects the following substantive revisions to the 2010 and 2011 Comprehensive Plan:

SUBJECT: WARRANT AMNESTY PROGRAM

As part of an ongoing effort to reduce the volume of undisposed cases with warrants and increase court collections, the Municipal Court Services Department is planning a one – time warrant amnesty program. Based on the research conducted by staff this program has not been previously utilized within the City of Fort Worth. The program period will be Monday, February 27, 2012 to Friday, March 23, 2012 to compliment the dates of the Statewide Warrant Roundup.

The Department has initiated several measures over the past three years to increase the disposition of outstanding cases including:

- The implementation of external collections;
- The expansion of payment options to online and telephone payments via Western Union;
- Participation in the annual statewide warrant round-up; and
- Full implementation of the state mandated in-house collections program

To compliment these measures the Department seeks to implement a limited warrant amnesty program under the following conditions:

- Defendant must appear voluntarily;
- Ticket must be in warrant status;
- Defendant must plead guilty or no-contest; and
- Defendant must pay remaining balance in full

The Municipal Court Services Department has approximately 600,000 outstanding warrants eligible for the program.

The warrant fee is a local fee that is attached to the case at the time a warrant is issued. There are two types of warrants that are generally referred to in Municipal Court:

- Capias- A capias (often referred to as an alias warrant) is a writ (written order) issued by the judge of the court having jurisdiction of a case after commitment or bail and before trial, or by a clerk at the direction of the judge and directed “to any peace officer of the State of Texas,” commanding the officer to arrest a person accused of an offense and bring the arrested person before that court immediately on a day or at a term stated in the writ. Art. 23.01, C.C.P.
- Capias Pro Fine-A capias pro fine (often referred to as a capias warrant) is a writ of the court issued by the judge when a judgment has been entered against a defendant who is not in custody and the defendant fails to satisfy the judgment.

The local Judge has authority to reduce and/or waive certain local fees and fines as prescribed by state law.

Staff recommends moving forward with this program and developing various media campaigns (print, radio, television, etc.) to support the amnesty program and the Statewide Warrant Roundup. We will coordinate with other local agencies to increase the exposure of our program.

A RESOLUTION FINDING THAT AN EMERGENCY SITUATION EXISTS AND REQUESTING THE GOVERNOR PERMIT THE CITY OF FORT WORTH TO HOLD A SPECIAL ELECTION ON A NON-UNIFORM ELECTION DATE TO ADDRESS THE EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Fort Worth, Texas consists of nine members, one of whom is the Mayor who is elected from the City at large and eight of whom are Council members who are elected from single member districts; and

WHEREAS, the City of Fort Worth is a home-rule municipal corporation incorporated in 1924; and

WHEREAS, Chapter III, Section 5 of the Charter of the City of Fort Worth provides that a quorum of the City Council consists of six (6) members; and

WHEREAS, under the Texas Open Meetings Act, a quorum of a governmental body is required to be present to conduct business; and

WHEREAS, Chapter III, Section 8 of the City Charter provides that a City Council member who becomes a candidate for nomination or election to any other public office forfeits his or her place on the Council but continues to hold the office until a successor is duly qualified; and

WHEREAS, the boundaries of a United States congressional district encompassing a portion of Fort Worth are currently under review by the Supreme Court of the United States and the timeline for final resolution of this issue remains uncertain; and

WHEREAS, one City Council member has announced her candidacy for another office, thereby forfeiting her City Council position and necessitating a special election to replace her; and

WHEREAS, additional members of the City Council have also expressed conditional interest in filing for the congressional district depending on its final constitution and their candidacy for such office will result in the forfeiture of their City Council positions; and



WHEREAS, the last date for a candidate to file for the United States congressional district is December 15, 2011; and

WHEREAS, the last City Council meeting for 2011 is December 13th, two days before the last congressional district filing date; and

WHEREAS, a number of significant issues, including the redistricting of the City Council single-member boundaries, face the City Council in the coming months; and

WHEREAS, the possibility of vacant council seats could present serious logistical challenges to the City Council's ability to meet the quorum requirements of the City Charter and conduct the City's business; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 41.001(a) of the Texas Election Code, the nearest uniform election date on which the City of Fort Worth could hold a special election is not until May 12, 2012; and

WHEREAS, Section 41.0011(b) of the Texas Election Code authorizes the authority of a political subdivision to hold a special election as an emergency election to fill a vacancy on a non-uniform date if the Governor of Texas determines that an emergency exists and grants permission to order an election on a non-uniform date.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FORT WORTH, TEXAS:

1. That the City Council hereby finds and determines that the circumstances outlined above threaten the City Council's ability to function and constitute an emergency situation.
2. That the City Council desires to order that a special emergency election be held on February 4, 2012, as permitted under Section 201.053 of the Texas Election Code, to fill the unexpired terms of any Council member who files for another office on or before January 5, 2012.
3. That the City Council hereby respectfully requests that the Honorable Rick Perry, Governor of Texas, determine that an emergency exists and grant permission for the City Council to order that a special election for all vacated and forfeited City Council seats be held on February 4, 2012, a non-uniform election date.



4. That should a runoff election be required as a result of the February 4, 2012 emergency special election the City Council hereby respectfully requests that the Honorable Rick Perry, Governor of Texas, grant permission for the City Council to order that a runoff election be held on March 24, 2012, a non-uniform election date.
5. That the Mayor is hereby authorized to forward a copy of this resolution to the Honorable Rick Perry.

DISCUSSION:

On May 24, 2011, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 19692-05-2011 that called a Run-Off Election for Saturday, June 18, 2011, for the purpose of electing the Mayor and a City Council Member for District 7, City of Fort Worth, Texas.

The agreement and contract with Tarrant County Elections Administration was approved on April 12, 2011, and provided for the election services, equipment, supplies and ballots needed to conduct the election, including the training and compensation of the election judges and clerks, preparation and distribution of ballots, arranging for use of public facilities for early voting and election day and the conduct of early and election day voting for the General Election held on May 14, 2011, and for those same services if the City had a run-off election. The agreement and contract did not provide the estimated cost for a run-off election and the cost for the run-off election has significantly exceeded the estimate authorized by the Council on April 12, 2011.

The final invoice for the June 18, 2011, Run-Off Election was received in the City Secretary's Office on November 4, 2011, for a total amount of \$507,604.63.

Funds for municipal elections are reserved in the Non-Departmental Budget of the General Fund.


The 2011-2015 annexation program, adopted with the 2011 Comprehensive Plan, anticipated this area would be an owner-initiated annexation in 2011 that would be an addition to Council District 3. As the property owner has yet to submit an annexation application, Council Member Zimmerman requested City-initiated annexation at the District 3 work-session for the 2012 Comprehensive Plan. The property under consideration for annexation as AX-12-001 is approximately 12.3 acres and currently is vacant land. Near-term commercial development is anticipated. The zoning of the enclave is anticipated to have public hearings in December 2011 and January 2012.

The purpose of tonight's public hearing is to collect public comments on the city-initiated annexation service plan for the Montserrat Commercial Area (AX-12-001). The services that the annexation area will receive immediately upon annexation are: police, fire, and emergency medical services; garbage pick-up; library services; building inspection and code compliance; maintenance of existing public water and sewer lines; and public roadway maintenance. The only Council action necessary is to close the public hearing after receiving public input. Final annexation action will take place at the January 10, 2012 City Council meeting, which will contain an M&C to consider and institute adoption of this enclave in the Far West sector.

12.3 Acres Under Consideration for Annexation





SERVICE PLAN FOR ANNEXED AREA

Property Subject to Plan: BEING 12.3 acres of land situated in the James F. Elliott Survey, Abstract Number 493; and the Thomas G. Zachary, Abstract 1759; situated about 9.0 miles South 66 degrees West of the Courthouse in Tarrant County, Texas.

Location and Acreage: Approximately 12.3 acres of land in Tarrant County, located west of SW Loop 820 and north of Team Ranch Road.

Municipal services to the Annexation Area will be furnished by or on behalf of the City of Fort Worth, Texas, at the following levels and in accordance with the following service plan programs:

1. PROGRAM FOR SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED ON THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THE ANNEXATION

The City will provide the following services in the Annexation Area on the effective date of the annexation, unless otherwise noted.

As used in this plan, the term 'providing services' includes having services provided by any method or means by which the City may extend municipal services to any other area of the City, including the City's infrastructure extension policies and developer or property owner participation in accordance with applicable city ordinances.

A. Police Protection

The Fort Worth Police Department will provide protection and law enforcement services in the Annexation Area commencing on the effective date of annexation. The services will include:

- Normal patrols and responses to calls for service
- Handling of offense and incident reports
- Special units, such as traffic enforcement, criminal investigations, narcotics law enforcement, gang suppression, and crime response team deployment when required.

These services are provided on a citywide basis. The area will be combined with existing Police Reporting Areas V140. The area will be added to Beat W24 in Zone W2 in West Division.

B. Fire Protection

Fire protection services will be provided by existing personnel and equipment of the Fort Worth Fire Department. These services will be provided based upon available water, road and street conditions, and distances from existing fire stations. Services will be provided to the annexation area commencing on the effective date of the annexation. These services include:

- Basic Life Support (BLS) 1st responder emergency medical services
- Fire suppression and rescue;
- Hazardous materials mitigation and regulation;
- Dive rescue;
- Technical rescue;
- Fire Safety Education;
- Aircraft/rescue/firefighting;
- Fire protection system plan review; and
- Inspections.

These services are provided on a citywide basis. All Fort Worth firefighters are certified by the Texas Commission on Fire Protection.

On the date of annexation, the first responding fire services will come from Fire Station 23, located at 3201 Portales Drive. The second responding fire company will be from Fire Station 30, located at 4416 Southwest Blvd. The Fire Department estimates the response time to be 4.8 and 7.7 minutes, respectively.

C. Emergency Medical Services – Basic Life Support

Basic Life Support (BLS) emergency medical services by existing personnel and equipment of the Fort Worth Fire Department will be provided to the annexation area commencing on the effective date of the annexation. The Fort Worth Fire Department serves as the first responder on life threatening medical emergencies as a part of the MedStar system. All Fort Worth Fire Department personnel are certified as Emergency Medical Technician basic level or higher. All engines, trucks, and rescue units carry Automated External Defibrillators for use with victims who are in cardiac arrest.

Emergency Medical Services – Advanced Life Support

Advanced Life Support response provided by MedStar is greater than 9 minutes to the proposed annexation area with a potential of at least a 30-minute transport time to the nearest trauma center.

D. Solid Waste Collection

Solid waste collection shall be provided to the Annexation Area in accordance with existing City ordinances and policies commencing on the effective date of the annexation. For residential collections, private solid waste service providers under contract with the City will provide services. Residential customers using the services of a privately owned solid waste management service provider other than the City's contracted service provider may continue to use such services until the second anniversary of the annexation. Residential areas that are Private Communities where the real property and all infrastructure are owned and maintained by a property owners association representing the residents and home owners of that private development will need to enter in to a service agreement with the City in order to receive solid waste collection service in accordance with Chapter 12.5-821(f) of the city ordinance.

At the discretion of the customer, private service providers may provide solid waste collection services for businesses and multi-family dwelling complexes having three or more units. Private solid waste collection providers must have an active Grant of Privilege issued by the City of Fort Worth to provide service within the city limits.

E. Operation and Maintenance of Water and Wastewater Facilities

Existing occupied homes that are using water well and on-site sewer facilities (and therefore have service) may continue to use the existing water well and on-site sewer facilities. If the existing property owner would like to connect to the City water and sewer system, then the property owner may request connection and receive up to 200 LF of water and sewer extension at City cost for each occupied property lot or tract in accordance with the "Policy for the Installation of Community Facilities" and as consistent with the Texas Local Government Code.

Upon connection to the City's water and sanitary sewer mains, water and sanitary sewage service will be provided at rates established by City ordinances for such service at the normal rates charged throughout the City.

F. Operation and Maintenance of Roads and Streets, Including Street Lighting

The following services will be provided in the Annexation Area commencing on the effective date of the annexation, unless otherwise noted.

These services include emergency pavement repair and repair maintenance of public streets on an as-needed basis. Preventive maintenance projects are prioritized on a region-wide basis and scheduled based on a variety of factors, including surface condition, ride ability, age, traffic volume,

functional class, and available funding. Any necessary rehabilitation or reconstruction will be considered and prioritized by the City.

Streetlights installed on improved public streets shall be maintained by the City of Fort Worth in accordance with current City policies. Other street lighting shall not be maintained by the City of Fort Worth.

The City will also provide regulatory signage services in the Annexation Area. Traffic signal, stop, and all other regulatory studies are conducted in conjunction with growth of traffic volumes. All regulatory signs and signals are installed when warranted following an engineering study. Faded, vandalized, or missing signs are replaced as needed. "CALL BACK" service is provided 24 hours a day, 365 days a year for emergency sign repair.

G. Operation and Maintenance of Parks, Playgrounds, and Swimming Pools

Residents of this property may utilize all existing parks and community service facilities throughout the City, beginning with the effective date of the annexation. Existing parks, playgrounds, swimming pools and other recreational and community facilities within the Annexation Area that are private facilities will be unaffected by the annexation.

Existing parks, playgrounds, swimming pools and other recreational and community facilities within this property shall, upon deeding to and acceptance by the City and appropriations for maintenance and operations, be operated by the City of Fort Worth, but not otherwise.

H. Operation and Maintenance of Any Other Publicly Owned Facility, Building or Service.

In the event the City acquires any other facilities, buildings or services necessary for municipal services located in the Annexation Area, the appropriate City department will provide maintenance services.

2. PROGRAM FOR PROVIDING ADDITIONAL SERVICES

In addition to the services identified above, the following services will be provided in the Annexation Area on the effective date of the annexation, unless otherwise noted:

A. The residents of the Annexation Area will receive the following library services from the Fort Worth Library commencing on the effective date of the annexation.

- Genealogy, Local History and Archival Collections
- Youth & Teen Services
- Interlibrary Loan to borrow materials from collections of 10,000 libraries
- Telephone, Mail and E-mail Reference Services
- Remote access to over 50 online databases
- U. S., Texas and City of Fort Worth documents
- Free computer classes for the public
- Large Print Books

B. The City will provide general municipal administration and administrative services.

C. The Annexation Area will be included in the Transportation and Public Works Department's Stormwater Utility service area. Properties in this area will be assessed a monthly fee based on the amount of impervious surface. The fees will cover the direct and indirect costs of stormwater management services, including routine maintenance (at current citywide service levels) for all public drainage channels and for all public storm sewers within dedicated public drainage easements. The Stormwater Utility will also provide floodplain management and information regarding flood plains, as well as watershed development review and inspection.

D. Enforcement of the City's code, consumer health, and animal care and control ordinances and regulations, that include but not limited to: high weeds and grass, trash and debris, solid waste, trash carts and illegal dumping, junked and abandoned vehicles, zoning, food, daycare, public pool and

spa inspections, stray animals, cruelty and bite investigations. Complaints of ordinance or regulation violations within the area will be answered and investigated by existing personnel within the appropriate department beginning on the effective date of the annexation.

- E. The City's building, plumbing, mechanical, electrical, and all other construction codes will be enforced within the Annexation Area beginning with the effective date of the annexation.
- F. The City's zoning, subdivision, sign, manufactured housing, junk yard and other ordinances shall be enforced in the Annexation Area beginning on the effective date of the annexation.
- G. All inspection services furnished by the City of Fort Worth, but not mentioned above, will be provided to the Annexation Area beginning on the effective date of the annexation.
- H. In addition to residential solid waste collection services, the Environmental Management Division will provide the following services:
 - Emergency spills and pollution complaints response;
 - Storm sewer discharge pollution prevention; and
 - Water quality assessments for creeks.

3. PROGRAM FOR PROVIDING FULL MUNICIPAL SERVICES WITHIN 2-½ YEARS

In addition to the services listed above, the City will provide full municipal services to the Annexation Area commensurate with the levels of services provided in other parts of the City except if differences in topography, land use, and population density constitute a sufficient basis for providing different levels of service, no later than two and one-half (2-½) years after the effective date of the annexation. If full municipal services cannot be reasonably provided within the aforementioned time period, the City will propose a schedule for providing said services within a period of four and one-half (4-½) years after the effective date of the annexation, and/or upon commencement of development of a subdivision within this property, whichever occurs later.

“Full municipal services” are services provided by the annexing municipality within its full-purpose boundaries, excluding gas or electrical service. The City shall provide the services by any of the methods by which it extends the services to any other area of the City.

4. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROGRAM

The developer will initiate acquisition or construction of capital improvements necessary for providing full municipal services adequate to serve the Annexation Area. Any such construction shall be substantially completed within two and one-half (2-½) years after the effective date of the annexation. If capital improvements necessary for providing full municipal services for the Annexation Area cannot be reasonably constructed within the aforementioned time period, the City will propose a schedule for providing said services within a period of four and one-half (4-½) years, and/or upon commencement of development of a subdivision within this property, whichever occurs later.

Acquisition or construction shall be accomplished by purchase, lease, or other contract. Any such construction shall be accomplished in a continuous process and shall be completed as soon as reasonably possible, consistent with generally accepted local engineering and architectural standards and practices.

- A. Police Protection. No capital improvements are necessary at this time to provide police protection to the Annexation Area. Need for construction of new facilities will be assessed periodically based on population growth, predicted growth and call volume.
- B. Fire Protection. Currently, Fire Station 23 has a 4.7 minute response time to the Annexation Area. No capital improvements are necessary at this time to provide fire protection to the Annexation Area. Need for construction of new facilities will be assessed periodically based on population growth, predicted growth, and call volume.

- C. Solid Waste Collection. No capital improvements are necessary at this time to provide solid waste collection services to the Annexation Area.
- D. Water and Wastewater. Fort Worth is currently maintaining the existing 16-inch water and 8-inch sewer mains located at east and south property boundaries.

Vacant properties' water and sewer extensions will be installed by the Developer in accordance with the "Policy for the Installation of Community Facilities". All water and wastewater facilities will be at the developer's cost and as consistent with the Texas Local Government Code. Water and sewer line sizes will be determined based upon the water/sewer study provided by the developer's engineer. Any City participation on water and sewer facilities will be in accordance with the "Installation Policy of Community Facilities" and the Texas Local Government Code. Upon connection, to existing water and sanitary sewer mains, water and sanitary sewage service will be provided at rates established by City ordinances for such service at the normal rates charged throughout the City.

- E. Roads. Future capital improvements are not estimated since this annexation consists of three commercial lots and right-of-way maintained by the Texas Department of Transportation. Private streets will not be maintained or improved by the City.
- F. Stormwater Utility. No capital improvements are necessary at this time to provide drainage services.
- G. Street Lighting. It is anticipated that new subdivisions in the Annexation Area will install street lighting in accordance with the City's standard policies and procedures. In other cases, the City will consider installation of additional street lighting in the Annexation Area upon request, with priority given to street lighting for traffic safety. Provision of street lighting will be in accordance with the City's street lighting policies, and those of the providing utility.
- H. Parks, Playgrounds and Swimming Pools. Capital improvements such as parkland acquisition and development of facilities will be dictated by future land use of the area, goals established by the Park, Recreation and Open Space Master Plan and appropriation of resources. Should additional residential development occur, parkland dedication, neighborhood park development and neighborhood park infrastructure or payment in lieu thereof will be required in accordance with the Park Dedication Policy of the Subdivision Ordinance.
- I. Other Publicly Owned Facilities, Building or Services: Additional Services. In general, other City functions and services, and the additional services described above can be provided for the Annexation Area by using existing capital improvements. Additional capital improvements are not necessary to provide City services.

5. IMPACT FEES

Notwithstanding any other provision of this service plan, a landowner within the Annexation Area will not be required to fund capital improvements necessary to provide municipal services in a manner inconsistent with Chapter 395 of the Local Government Code governing impact fees, unless otherwise agreed to by the landowner.

DISCLAIMER: This report provides a snapshot of the Fort Worth Police Department's National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) data that was queried from the Records Management System (RMS) on November 1, 2011. The Department's RMS is updated regularly based on on-going investigations, but a snapshot of this data is taken at the point that the Texas Department of Public Safety has reviewed and certified the data so that the Fort Worth Police Department has the ability to provide more detailed data, including information at the Council District level. It should be noted that since this is a snapshot, data queried before or after this date is apt to change and may vary from other reports.

Section I.

Understanding Crime Reporting

1.1 National Perspective on Reporting Crime: Transitioning from Uniform Crime Reporting to National Incident-Based Reporting System

According to the National Incident-Based Reporting System, Volume 1: Data Collection Guidelines, by the U.S. Department of Justice,

“Since the establishment of the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program in 1930, the volume, diversity, and complexity of crime steadily increased while the UCR Program remained virtually unchanged. Recognizing the need to address crime’s growing challenge, the law enforcement community in the late 1970s called for a thorough study of the UCR Program with the objective of revising the Program to meet law enforcement’s needs into the twenty-first century. The National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) is the result of that study.”

The FBI began accepting NIBRS data from a handful of agencies in January 1989. As more contributing law enforcement agencies become more knowledgeable about the rich data available through incident-based reporting and as resources permit, more agencies are implementing the NIBRS. Although participation in NIBRS is purely voluntary, based on 2009 data submissions, approximately 44 percent of reporting agencies throughout the nation are NIBRS certified. Until an agency is ready to participate and subsequently becomes certified, it will continue to submit data in accordance with the requirements of the traditional UCR Program. As it is recognized that the transition from the old to the new system will take considerable time, the national UCR Program will continue to collect, process, and publish traditional UCR data. This will be accomplished by collecting data in the old format from agencies not participating in NIBRS and by extracting the traditional summary data from the more comprehensive submissions of agencies participating in NIBRS.

The result will be a continuation of the traditional statistical time series and a gradual phase-in of the newer forms of statistics made possible by NIBRS. This parallel operation of the old and new systems will continue until such time as it is determined that the old system can be discontinued.

1.2 Fort Worth’s Crime Report

Fort Worth understands the importance of collecting and reporting more detailed, accurate, and meaningful incident-based data, and so in January 2006, Fort Worth became certified to participate in the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) and began reporting NIBRS data to the Texas Department of Public Safety. With the use of the NIBRS, the Fort Worth Police Department now has the capability to generate reports reflecting a multitude of interrelationships among the collected data—enhancing its ability to analyze crime trends and to implement tactical strategies accordingly. NIBRS data is of great value to the City of Fort Worth!

As stated above, in 2009, approximately 44 percent of the reporting agencies throughout the nation were NIBRS certified, and more and more agencies are transitioning to NIBRS. In the meantime, the FBI will continue to report UCR data (by extracting UCR data from NIBRS data) until such time the Uniform Crime Reporting can be discontinued. FBI data is used to identify national and regional crime trends. And although the FBI does not recommend using its data for ranking purposes, it is often used for rankings and at this time is often considered the best available information to compare crime from one jurisdiction to another. Since UCR data is available for all reporting agencies nationwide, it also has value for comparison purposes.

Since one of Fort Worth’s Strategic Goals is to become one of the nation’s safest major cities, the FBI data, along with other third party rankings, are used to determine if we are making progress towards this goal/vision. Therefore, the Fort Worth Police Department sees value in reporting both NIBRS data and UCR data so that elected officials, city leaders and the public can review the detailed crime data, and yet still be able to put it in perspective (in a very general sense) with how Fort Worth compares to other peer cities.

1.3 Understanding NIBRS Figures

NIBRS compiles detailed reports on two types of offenses: Group "A" offenses and Group "B" offenses. The two groupings are based on the amount of reporting required for each. Both incidents and arrests are reported for Group "A" offenses, and only arrests are reported for Group "B" offenses.

The following criteria was used to determine if a crime should be designated as a Group "A" offense:

1. The seriousness or significance of the offense.
2. The frequency or volume of its occurrence.
3. The prevalence of the offense nationwide.
4. The probability of the offense being brought to law enforcement's attention.
5. The likelihood that law enforcement is the best channel for collecting data regarding the offense.
6. The burden placed on law enforcement in collecting data on the offense.
7. The national statistical validity and usefulness of the collected data.
8. The national UCR Program's responsibility to make crime data available not only to law enforcement but to others having a legitimate interest in it.

Group "A" offenses are categorized into one of the three following categories: 1) Crimes Against Person; 2) Crimes Against Property; 3) Crimes Against Society.

- 1) Crimes Against Person = Scores one offense for each victim
- 2) Crimes Against Property = Scores one offense for each distinct operation
(except Motor Vehicle Theft / one offense is counted per stolen vehicle)
- 3) Crime Against Society = Scores one offense for each violation

NIBRS Group A includes the following 22 Offenses:

- Homicide Offenses
- Sex Offenses, Forcible
- Sex Offenses, Non-forcible
- Robbery
- Assault Offenses
- Burglary / Breaking and Entering
- Larceny / Theft Offenses
- Motor Vehicle Theft
- Arson
- Bribery
- Counterfeiting / Forgery
- Destruction / Damage / Vandalism of Property
- Drug / Narcotic Offenses
- Embezzlement
- Extortion / Blackmail
- Fraud Offenses
- Gambling Offenses
- Kidnapping / Abduction
- Pornography / Obscene Material
- Prostitution Offenses
- Stolen Property Offenses
- Weapon Law Violations

UCR Part I includes the following eight offenses: Criminal Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson.

1.4 Significant Methodology and Definition Differences

A significant difference between NIBRS and UCR Traditional Summary Reporting is that for Crimes Against Persons, NIBRS counts the number of victims, while UCR counts the number of incidents, which can result in NIBRS figures being higher than UCR figures depending on the number of victims involved in the incidents. The definitions for Part 1 offenses used in Summary Reporting are different than the offense definitions used by the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS). Section II.

National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS)

3rd Quarter 2011 Citywide NIBRS Crime Report

2.1 Overall citywide crime has decreased -2.4% for the 3rd Quarter and -2.4% year-to-date. Notable decreases are murder (-22.2%) counterfeiting (-24.7%) and theft from building (-41%). Crimes Against Persons increased 9.5% while Crime Against Property increased slightly 0.6% compared to the 3rd Quarter in 2010. The following table provides a comprehensive list of Fort Worth's citywide NIBRS Group A offenses by Crimes Against Persons, Crimes Against Property, and Crimes Against Society. These trends and enforcement efforts will also be explained in more detail throughout this report.

2.3 Crimes Against Persons (NIBRS - Group A)

Crimes Against Persons increased 9.5% citywide, with 3,551 offenses (victims) reported in 3rd Quarter 2011 compared to 3,244 offenses (victims) reported in 3rd Quarter 2010. Murder, kidnapping, and intimidation decreased, while assault and sex offenses increased during the 3rd Quarter. Of all the Crimes Against Persons, approximately 51% were domestic-related.

Most Crimes Against Person victims are victims of simple assaults, which is defined as an unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury. Simple assaults increased – 7.9% this quarter, and overall approximately 62% were domestic-related. These are followed by aggravated assaults. Aggravated assaults increased 19.5%. Approximately 36% of the aggravated assaults were domestic-related. Approximately 78% occurred within a residence, 13% near a roadway, 4% in a parking lot or parking garage, and 0.6% in a bar or night club. A total of 237 aggravated assault arrests were made during the 3rd Quarter.

Intimidation is also an assault offense, which is defined as to unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack. Intimidation offenses decreased 0.7% compared to 3rd Quarter 2010.

Forcible rape offenses increased 20.7% with 17 more offenses in 3rd Quarter 2011 compared to 3rd Quarter 2010. Of the 99 forcible rape offenses, the majority were known-offender related, and approximately 49% were victims 17 years of age or under.

Detectives are investigating a trend that may involve a possible serial rapist. Detectives and Crime Analysts have identified a mode of operandi and are working diligently to identify a suspect.

The “Other” forcible sex offenses as listed below includes forcible sodomy, sexual assault with an object, and forcible fondling, which increased 2.2% this quarter compared to 3rd Quarter 2010. Approximately 84% involve victims 17 years of age or under. Of the 137 “Other” forcible sex offenses reported in the 3rd Quarter, 49 incidents actually occurred prior to the reporting period dating back to 1998.

2.3 Crimes Against Person (NIBRS - Group A) Continued...

Kidnapping/Abduction decreased -7.7% with three less offenses in 3rd Quarter 2011 compared 3rd Quarter 2010. It is important to understand what is included in this count.

<p>Kidnapping/Abduction is defined by the National Incident Based Reporting System as the unlawful seizure, transportation, and/or detention of a person against his/her will or of a minor without the consent of his/her custodial parent or legal guardian.</p> <p>The Texas Penal Code breaks this definition out further by unlawful restraint, kidnapping, aggravated kidnapping, and unlawful transport. Please refer to Texas Penal Code Title 5, Chapter 20 for full definitions, but below are abbreviated definitions of each:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Unlawful restraint - Intentionally or knowingly restrains another person.... <i>Restrain—Restrict a person’s movements without consent, so as to interfere substantially with the person’s liberty, by moving the person from one place to another or by confining the</i>	<p><i>person. 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Of the 36 kidnapping offenses this quarter, there were 19 unlawful restraints, 11 kidnappings, and 6 aggravated kidnappings. Approximately 56% were known suspect-related, and the majority were domestic-related involving dating or child custody issues. In eight cases, the victim was dating the suspect—seven were unlawful restraints and one was an aggravated kidnapping.

There were fourteen Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter victims, which is a 22.2% decrease citywide compared to 3rd Quarter 2010. Six of the fourteen cases have had dispositions filed. The motives of these murders range from being gang-related, to robbery/narcotic, to arguments. In ten of the cases, the weapon used was handgun or shotgun, while two involved knives.


The West Division experienced five homicides attributed to members of a gang. This loose-knit group was targeting other members for various reasons. The motives for the shootings appeared to be for monetary purposes and domestic disputes. These murder suspects were also suspects in several robberies. There have been six arrests

for homicides so far, and the investigations are continuing. The Robbery Unit and the Gang Intelligence Section has been working diligently on these investigations.

During the week of July 11th, the Fugitive Unit began working with Homicide Detectives in an effort to locate individuals wanted in connection with several homicides. The Fugitive Unit participated in the arrest of (4) four murder suspects over the course of a week. They all used good judgment and certain investigative skills, which made the apprehension of these dangerous suspects possible. The Fugitive Unit and Major Case have worked long hours and have exemplified their dedication and professionalism.

Operation Blue Tsunami—South Division

The Information Management Division proactively identified prolific offenders within South Division, and determined that there had been significant gang-related activities, which may have attributed to the increase in Crimes Against Persons. Aggravated assaults increased during the 3rd Quarter and most assaults were occurring within residences or street locations. Within this area, the average age of the assault victims were 29 year old males, while the average age of juvenile victims were 15 year old males.

Operation Blue Tsunami was a South Division initiative conducted in July and August to address violent crime in certain areas of the Division. The two primary goals of this operation were the identification/disruption of South Division prolific offenders and improvement of police-community relations. The operation was a two-tiered effort designed to reduce crime through intelligence-led policing and to increase partnerships within the community. The operation was a highly coordinated enforcement effort conducted with NPOs, Zero Tolerance, Patrol, Citizens on Patrol mem-

bers and other support units. This operation was designed to have participating uniform personnel move from one identified hotspot to the next, preceded by plain clothed Zero Tolerance officers and followed by Citizens on Patrol members to monitor areas for post-enforcement criminal activities.

Improving police community relations was accomplished through citizen participation (COPs) in enforcement efforts and a concerted effort by officers, during all police-citizen interactions with the goal of developing greater citizen participation in crime prevention strategies. The operation was conducted at varied times and days in an unpredictable pattern, to maximize the disruption of criminal activity.

The success of this operation was reflected by a 14% decline in Crimes Against Persons in South Division in July and a 11% decline in Crimes Against Persons in South Division in August compared to the same time period in 2010.


2.4 Crimes Against Property (NIBRS - Group A)

Crimes Against Property increased 0.6% citywide, with 13,330 offenses reported in 3rd Quarter 2011 compared to 13,252 offenses reported in 3rd Quarter 2010. Notable increases were burglary of residence (19.8%), embezzlement (12.8%), robbery (10.9%) and theft from vehicle (7.8%). Also notable is the decrease in theft from building, counterfeiting/forgery and theft of vehicle parts this quarter compared to 3rd Quarter 2010.

2.4 Crimes Against Property (NIBRS - Group A) Continued...

Central/South Division Crime Suppression Plan

The Fort Worth Police Department began the implementation of a two-phased Crime Suppression Plan in the 3rd Quarter which focused on outreach to the homeless population within the Directions Home, Primary and Secondary High Impact Zones (Central Division), as well as, residential burglaries in South Division.

The fundamental purpose of the Homeless Outreach Initiative was to increase public safety and awareness and to open the lines of communication between the police department and the homeless community. The outreach efforts also assist in identifying individuals that may be preying upon the homeless community, and/or selling drugs within and around the homeless community.

The Homeless Outreach Initiative began in September. During the initiative, additional officers were assigned to staff the Day Resource Center at 1415 East Lancaster Avenue to provide the homeless community more access to police resources and a safe place to talk to an officer away from other people. Officers also increased their presence in the homeless corridor and accompanied charity organizations who deliver items to the homeless camps and talked to the residents about what they can do to keep themselves from being victimized.

In addition, officers visited several known homeless camps—documenting new camps or changes in existing camps, providing literature regarding crime reporting, personal safety, and crime prevention, and facilitating increased communication.

The second phase of the crime suppression plan began in October, which addressed residential burglaries in zone C4 and it is anticipated that this effort will drive down the residential burglaries in that area in the 4th Quarter.

The change in police activity had a positive effect on the number of homeless victims in the area. There was a decrease in the number of homeless victims in this area both from the previous month of August 2011 and from the number of victims in September 2010.

Crimes Against Society figures are an indication of the department's enforcement efforts and are counted one offense per violation. Enforcement efforts have lead to an overall 3.1% increase in offenses/reports related to Crimes Against Society.

2.6 Other Offenses (NIBRS—Group B)

Group “B” offenses are reported only when an arrest is involved. A Group “B” Arrest Report does not include incident data but uses only data elements that describe the arrestee and the circumstances of the arrest. Group “B” offenses decreased 16.5% overall with decreases in all offense types except runaway and bad checks.

Interagency DWI Detail on IH-20:

In the recent months, there have been several alcohol-related fatalities in Fort Worth. So far this year, Fort Worth has had 62 traffic-related fatalities, 30 of which have been alcohol-related. The Fort Worth Police Department is working diligently to reduce alcohol-related traffic accidents through enforcement and educational efforts. We are coordinating efforts through interagency details and increased patrol on freeways.

Since the first of the year, Fort Worth officers have made 1,144 DWI arrests. This past Fourth of July, the Fort Worth Police Department participated in the Texas Statewide No Refusal, Anti-DWI Campaign along with other Texas law enforcement agencies. This detail utilized on-duty and overtime Traffic Division DWI personnel through Crime Control and Prevention District funding. We sponsored a registered nurse to perform blood draws pursuant to DWI laws, and as a result of this effort, Fort Worth Police Officers made 38 DWI arrests.

We have been working with Arlington, Grand Prairie and Dallas County to conduct DWI details on Friday and Saturdays along I-20. Over just a two weekend period, these details led to 259 stops, 231 speeding citations, 4 DWI arrests, one DUI minor citation, 2 minor in possession of alcohol, and one minor consumption of alcohol—a total of 348 citations using this regional approach. We are also working to increase our educational efforts and trying to reach out to young adults. The Fort Worth Police Department is working hard to keep our streets safe.

2.7 Gang Unit Report

A total of 359 gang-related incidents occurred in the 3rd Quarter 2011 compared to 401 gang-related incidents in 3rd Quarter 2010—a 10.5% decrease in gang crime.

It should be noted that a single incident may involve multiple offenses. For example, an incident may involve a narcotic violation and an assault offense, which would be documented within one report and then flagged as a gang-related incident. The table below shows the number of offenses within the gang-related incident reports.

What is Gang-Related Crime?

Gang-Related Crime is any criminal act, including but not limited to those, involving gang members or gang associates committed for the benefit or furtherance of any criminal gang.

The Fort Worth Gang Section, together with narcotics officers, completed a year-long investigation of gang members who were involved in trafficking narcotics in Fort Worth. Gang officers dug through trash, obtained information from seized phones, and conducted surveillance to build the case. The investigation yielded twenty-two federal and one state arrest warrants. The arrests made a significant step in the dismantlement of several gang members organized to distribute crack cocaine in the community.

The Fort Worth Gang Intelligence Section also assisted the FBI in the investigation of a gang and its affiliates that resulted in the arrest of 28 suspects nationwide—19 of which were connected to Fort Worth. Most of the arrests were related to narcotics and weapons.

The Gang Intervention and Prevention Unit also began presenting the Gang Resistance Education and Training (G.R.E.A.T.) in several schools in Fort Worth. The program is a gang and violence prevention program built around school-based, law enforcement officer-instructed classroom curricula. The program is intended to reduce and/or prevent delinquent behavior, youth violence, and gang activity.

Figure 10 - 3rd Quarter 2011 Gang-Related Arrests By Division





Figure 11 - 2008-2011 Comparison of Citywide Gang-Related Offenses

Figure 13 - Fort Worth City Council District Map




Figure 14—Offenses Reported in Council District 2

Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Traditional Summary Report

4.1 3rd Quarter 2011 Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Traditional Summary Report

Uniform Crime Report (UCR) Traditional Summary Reporting is a collective effort on the part of jurisdictions throughout the United States to present a nationwide view of crime using eight of the most serious and most commonly reported crimes including Criminal Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft and Arson, also known as Part 1 crimes. In the Summary Reporting System, simply the number of criminal incidents are counted, as opposed to the more detailed data collected (using a different methodology) through the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS).

Below represents the number of criminal incidents for each Part 1 crime:

The UCR data shows a total of eight offense types, which in the 3rd Quarter 2011 increased by 5.7% compared to the 3rd Quarter 2010. For comparison purposes, if you were to use the same eight Part 1 offense types, but use NIBRS methodology, the 3rd Quarter 2011 increased 6.7%. Of all twenty-two NIBRS Group A offenses, 3rd Quarter crime increased 2.4% overall.

Quick Note About Reporting Differences

A significant difference between NIBRS and UCR Traditional Summary Reporting is the number of crimes being reported and the methodology used. For example, for Crimes Against Persons, NIBRS counts the number of victims, while UCR counts the number of incidents, which can result in NIBRS figures being higher than UCR figures depending on the number of victims involved in the incidents. In addition, the definitions for Part 1 offenses used in Summary Reporting are different than the offense definitions used by the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS). The Fort Worth Police Department submits NIBRS data to the Texas Department of Public Safety (TXDPS), which is then submitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). The FBI then converts the NIBRS data into the UCR Traditional Summary Reporting for publication in the annual *Crime in the United States*. Since the data presented in this report is snapshot data queried on November 1, 2011, data queried before or after this date is apt to change and may vary from other reports.

Section V.

Department Initiatives Update

Woodhaven Storefront Opens

The opening ceremony for the Police storefront at 1200 Woodhaven Boulevard was held on September 2, 2011. This storefront was a joint effort between a faith-based organization, local businesses and the City. Potter's House expanded their Dallas operation and purchased a property that had been unoccupied for a while. Potter's House offered a 1,625 square foot retail location for a nominal fee of \$100.00 per month to use as a police storefront. Since the closing of the police facility on Boca Raton, there has not been a police facility that served that community. Chief Halstead agreed to proceed in using this space as a storefront. Council Member Danny Scarth was instrumental in securing cooperation with IT, through the City Manager's Office, to retrofit the location with necessary hardware to power and operate the computers and phone lines that would be required to conduct police business.

The Woodhaven Community Development Inc, a consortium of area businesses and entrepreneurs, garnered donations in excess of \$10,000 to completely furnish the storefront to include desks, chairs, conference table, microwave, refrigerator, etc for the officers and citizens that would be using this facility. Currently four Neighborhood Police Officers work from this office, which is open for use by patrol officers to make reports 24 hours a day. Since this building opening, there has been a substantial increase in police presence in the area that has been instrumental in reducing crime and enhancing the feeling of safety by the citizens and businesses in this community. In addition, this storefront offers a location for officers to make reports and meet citizens without requiring them to travel to patrol headquarters on Nashville or the Criminal Investigation Section office on Lancaster.



Citizens on Patrol Seminar

The 20th Annual Citizens on Patrol Seminar was held on Saturday September 24, 2011 at River Ranch in the Stockyards. The seminar celebrated the 20th anniversary of the Citizens on Patrol program which was started in 1991. Twenty citizens received the 20-Year Appreciation of Service Award. This was the first year the event was held in Fort Worth's Historical Stockyards. The Crime Control and Prevention District was the main sponsor of the event. Other sponsors included Home Depot and funding raised through the CODE Blue Golf Tournament. Four Day Weekend provided the entertainment.

Departmental Promotions

On August 26, 2011, a promotion ceremony was held for twenty-two sworn personnel being promoted to one Lieutenant, two Sergeants, and nineteen Corporals.



Community Advisory Board TASER Demonstration

On September 19, 2011, Chief Halstead met with the Community Advisory Board at 1100 Nashville for a TASER demonstration. A presentation was given by Sgt. Mark Wilson, which showed how the department has used the TASER, the circumstances under which TASER is used and various statistics tracking the use of TASER by Fort Worth police officers.

Community Advisory Board members represent various communities/interest groups, including the deaf and hard of hearing, GLBT and ethnic minority populations.

Pocket Citation Software

The Police Department recently purchased "Pocket Citation" software from Advanced Public Safety. This software will allow officers to produce an electronic citation that will be customized with the city's violation codes, NCIC lists and local geographic information. Using handheld units, officers will be able to scan the driver's license and vehicle registration information into the form and print the ticket from a blue-tooth enabled printer. Pocket Citation is also being integrated into the Court's CourtView system. Citation data will be exported from the handheld units and imported into the CourtView system. This will allow for fewer errors and improved workflow.

Electronic Accident Reporting

Fort Worth officers have been trained to use Report Beam software to electronically complete accident crash reports. The accident data collected will be entered into a traffic database and will be readily available for statistical reporting and analysis.

The new software also allows citizens to obtain a copy of their accident report faster for insurance purposes. Previously, officers completed these reports manually and then sent them to Police Records to be processed. This process could take up to seven work days. The new software cuts this time in half. This project is being implemented in three phases and is expected to be fully implemented by August of 2012:

- Phase 1—Officers begin using the Report Beam software at sectors December 2011
- Phase 2—Patrol vehicle installation of the software targeted for January 2012
- Phase 3—All data will be sent electronically to TXDOT—August 2012

Fort Worth is the second police agency in the State of Texas after Richardson PD (which started using the Report Beam software in March of 2011) and is the largest agency in the state, to use Electronic Accident software. The new software will increase efficiency by keeping all reports electronically saving personnel and copying costs.
