

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**SUBJECT: October 2012 – Sales Tax Update**

Sales tax revenue represents approximately 20% of the City’s General Fund budget. Staff is committed to providing you regular updates on this important and sometimes volatile revenue source. The Texas Comptroller’s Office posted results on December 12th. The results are dependent upon the timeliness and accuracy of sales tax payers’ returns. This payment from the State represents taxes collected on sales that occurred primarily in the month of October. In this report, you will see Fort Worth’s sales tax collection compared to last year and the impact on the current year’s budget.




The City’s net sales tax collection is up \$1,774,730 or 23.5% compared to this month last year. These collections are the best on record for the month of October. However, net collections for October 2011 were reduced by an audit adjustment of **\$576,424**. This adjustment was the result of a Plano company paying sales tax to cities that were receiving goods, rather than the source city (Plano). The adjustment covered the period from Jan 2008 to Dec 2009. As depicted in the table below, “current period collections” increased 13.0% over last year, signaling a continued improvement in pure economic activity.

The City has collected **\$1,431,062** or **1.3%** more than the FY2013 adopted budget. As depicted above, you will also see how the positive results are affecting our partner agencies. These are the first collections for the fiscal year and while they are encouraging, Staff recommends maintaining a conservative forecast for FY2013 as we continue to experience uncertainty with the national economy and potential audit adjustments. **SUBJECT: DRAFT 2013 COMPREHENSIVE PLAN COMMUNITY MEETINGS**

The purpose of this report is to provide the City Council with the results of Comprehensive Plan community meetings held this fall (See Exhibit A). The draft 2013 Comprehensive Plan is an alternate-year partial update and includes only the three trend chapters and the appendix items, including the Future Land Use Maps, Capital Improvement Program and Annexation Program. A full update of the Comprehensive Plan will be completed for 2014.

Since August, City staff has met with more than 300 people at 15 separate meetings. Staff did not receive any substantive recommended changes to the draft plan, but staff did hear from several residents that street and facility projects need to be completed faster. Staff also responded to several requests for street construction updates. The community meetings focused on the Capital Improvement Program development process and solicited feedback on infrastructure needs. A City Council Planning Workshop is scheduled for January 9, and staff will provide updated status and recommendations on potential future projects including comments received at the public meetings.

The Planning and Development Department encourages public participation in the Comprehensive Plan update process by publishing articles in City News and posting notices on Facebook and Twitter, as well as posting update information and the draft plan on the City's website. Staff meets individually with interested business organizations and neighborhood associations at their request.

Staff also held three annexation meetings in Far North Fort Worth where approximately 90 citizens were briefed on the annexation program for their property. Approximately 15 people attended the meeting for areas in Districts 2 and 7. Attendees expressed some concern about being annexed, but mainly asked questions about the process and how they would be affected. About 50 people attended a special meeting for enclave Area 10-1 in District 7 adjacent to Haslet, which the City Council would add to the three-year annexation plan for annexation consideration in 2015. Area 38 in District 7 along Jacksboro Highway also had a special meeting, since the enclave is proposed to move from the long-range program to the five-year program. About 30 people attended the meeting for Area 38. At both special meetings, the comments ranged from strong objections to minor concerns about being annexed. The City Council will consider nine of the areas in the five-year annexation program for annexation in 2013.

The next steps in the update process include a public hearing on January 23 with the City Plan Commission followed by a public hearing with the City Council on February 12. Staff will ask the City Council to adopt the 2013 Comprehensive Plan on February 26.

### APPOINTING AN ARTS FUNDING TASK FORCE TO ADVISE THE CITY COUNCIL ABOUT THE CITY'S FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR ARTS AND CULTURAL EXCHANGE PROGRAMS

**AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF AGREEMENTS WITH

REQUESTING NCTCOG TO PURSUE DEVELOPMENT OF  
THE COTTON BELT RAIL PROJECT  
UTILIZING SENATE BILL 1048**

**WHEREAS**, the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) is a Regional Planning Commission operating under Local Government Code Chapter 391; and

**WHEREAS**, NCTCOG has been approached by a private-sector developer which has formally communicated interest in developing the Cotton Belt Passenger Rail Project; and

**WHEREAS**, through passage of Senate Bill 1048, the 82nd Texas Legislature enacted Chapters 2267 and 2268, Texas Government Code, which authorize public-private partnerships by eligible governmental entities in the State of Texas, including Regional Planning Commissions, and establish the framework and processes required to enter into such arrangements; and

**WHEREAS**, Senate Bill 1048 enables a Responsible Governmental Entity to receive solicited or unsolicited proposals, encourages competition by requiring posting of and acceptance of competing proposals for a qualifying project, calls for collaboration with affected jurisdictions in which all or part of a project is located, and permits award of interim and/or comprehensive project development agreements; and

**WHEREAS**, in order for NCTCOG to qualify as the Responsible Governmental Entity and assist the region in advancing development of the Cotton Belt Passenger Rail Project, agreements with member governments along the corridor statutorily authorized to develop passenger rail projects are necessary; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Fort Worth supports innovative approaches to infrastructure delivery and desires to contract with NCTCOG to utilize Senate Bill 1048 to procure a public-private partnership to develop the Cotton Belt Passenger Rail Project, in whole or in part, on its behalf; and

**WHEREAS**, this innovative public-private partnership approach to develop the Cotton Belt Passenger Rail Project, if proven successful, could provide a model for development of future high-priority passenger rail corridors in the region; and



**WHEREAS**, NCTCOG, Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART), Fort Worth Transportation Authority (The T), and Denton County Transportation Authority (DCTA) have developed a joint procurement process under Senate Bill 1048 and Texas Transportation Code Chapter 452 to develop the Cotton Belt Passenger Rail Project which involves city representation in the evaluation process.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FORT WORTH, TEXAS:**

- Section 1.** The City of Fort Worth requests and authorizes NCTCOG to develop the Cotton Belt Passenger Rail Project on its behalf as the Responsible Governmental Entity utilizing Senate Bill 1048 to procure a public-private partnership jointly with DART, The T and DCTA.
- Section 2.** This Resolution shall be transmitted to NCTCOG and all affected jurisdictions along the corridor.
- Section 3.** The City Manager or an Assistant City Manager is hereby authorized to execute agreements with NCTCOG to effectuate this Resolution in the name of the City of Fort Worth.
- Section 4.** This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

**SUBJECT:** Natural Gas Pipeline Regulation in Fort Worth

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In response to recent news stories and various communications to the Mayor and City Council, we would like to provide you with an overview of the City's authority to regulate natural gas pipelines.

Natural gas pipeline regulations exist at the city, state and federal levels depending on the type of pipeline. The U.S. Code of Federal Regulations, Title 49, Part 192, sets the minimum standards and good practices for pipeline safety. Those pipelines are regulated by the U.S. Department of Transportation's Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration that includes the Office of Pipeline Safety. Gas pipelines including transmission mains and gathering lines within the state of Texas also fall under the jurisdiction of the Texas Railroad Commission's Pipeline Safety Division and are regulated under the Chapter 121 and 181 of the Texas Utilities Code and Chapter 8 of the Texas Administrative Code, which supplements the federal regulations. Safety provisions for gas lines are primarily found in Chapter 121. Chapter 121 of the Texas Utilities Code states that "[a] municipality or a county may not adopt or enforce an ordinance that establishes a safety standard or practice applicable to a facility that is regulated under this subchapter, another state law, or a federal law." However, municipalities may "adopt an ordinance that establishes conditions for mapping, inventorying, locating, or relocating pipelines over, under, along or across a public street or alley or private residential area in the boundaries of the municipality" and are not further limited if the law provides for specific powers regarding pipelines.

The City's Gas Drilling Ordinance provides for regulation of "City Regulated Pipelines" consistent with our authority under state law. The Gas Drilling Review Committee and licensing of right-of-way crossings are tools used to encourage the placement of gas pipelines away from residential areas whenever possible. However, pipelines that do not cross City right-of-way or private residential areas are not regulated by the Gas Drilling Ordinance. The City does have a requirement for submittal of "Record Drawings" after completion of a City Regulated Pipeline. The submittal and subsequent mapping of these pipelines was a requirement introduced in the 2009 Gas Drilling Ordinance amendments. While these data may be useful to emergency responders, they are incomplete and will only be useful as supplemental data. Texas Railroad Commission data show that there were approximately 600 miles of gas pipeline within the City's corporate boundaries up to the 2009 amendments. The City maintains a list of gas pipeline operators and key contact personnel. Markers are required in the filed showing the locations of all street crossings, the operator's name, and an emergency phone number.

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**DISCLAIMER:** This report provides a snapshot of the Fort Worth Police Department's National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) data that was queried from the Records Management System (RMS) on December 12, 2012. The Department's RMS is updated regularly based on ongoing investigations. The data in this snapshot has been reviewed and certified by the Texas Department of Public Safety. Since this is a snapshot, data queried before or after this date is apt to change and may vary from other reports.

# **Section I.**

## **Understanding Crime Reporting**

## **1.1 National Perspective on Reporting Crime: Transitioning from Uniform Crime Reporting to National Incident-Based Reporting System**

According to the National Incident-Based Reporting System, Volume 1: Data Collection Guidelines, by the U.S. Department of Justice,

“Since the establishment of the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program in 1930, the volume, diversity, and complexity of crime steadily increased while the UCR Program remained virtually unchanged. Recognizing the need to address crime’s growing challenge, the law enforcement community in the late 1970s called for a thorough study of the UCR Program with the objective of revising the Program to meet law enforcement’s needs into the twenty-first century. The National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) is the result of that study.”

In January 1989, the FBI began accepting NIBRS data from a handful of agencies. As more contributing law enforcement agencies learn about the rich data available through incident-based reporting (and as resources permit), more agencies are implementing the NIBRS. Although participation in NIBRS is purely voluntary, about 44 percent of all law enforcement agencies were NIBRS certified as of May 2011 (based on that year’s data submissions). Until an agency becomes certified, it continues to submit data in accordance with the requirements of the traditional UCR Program. Because the transition to the new system will take considerable time, the national UCR Program will continue to collect, process, and publish traditional UCR data. This is accomplished by collecting data in the old format from agencies not participating in NIBRS and by extracting traditional summary data from the more comprehensive submissions of agencies participating in NIBRS.

The result is a continuation of the traditional statistical time series and a gradual phase-in of the newer forms of statistics made possible by NIBRS. This parallel operation of the old and new systems will be maintained until it is determined that the old system can be discontinued.

## **1.2 Fort Worth’s Crime Report**

Fort Worth understands the importance of collecting and reporting detailed, accurate, and meaningful incident-based data. In January 2006, Fort Worth was certified to participate in the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) and began reporting NIBRS data to the Texas Department of Public Safety. With the use of the NIBRS, the Fort Worth Police Department now has the capability to generate reports reflecting a multitude of interrelationships among the collected data — enhancing its ability to analyze crime trends and to implement tactical strategies. NIBRS data is of great value to the City of Fort Worth!

As noted above, in 2011, approximately 44 percent of the reporting agencies throughout the nation were NIBRS certified, and an increasing number of agencies are transitioning to NIBRS. In the meantime, the FBI continues to report UCR data (by extracting UCR data from NIBRS data) until such time as the Uniform Crime Reporting can be discontinued. FBI data is used to identify national and regional crime trends. FBI data is often used for rankings — although the FBI does not recommend this practice — and is often considered the best available information to compare crime from one jurisdiction to another. Since UCR data is available for all reporting agencies nationwide, it is also used for the purpose of making comparisons.

One of Fort Worth’s five Strategic Goals is to become the safest major city in the United States. The FBI data, along with other third-party rankings, are used to determine if we are making progress towards this goal/vision. The Fort Worth Police Department reports both NIBRS data and UCR data so that elected officials, city leaders and the public can review the detailed crime data, and yet still be able to understand (in a very general sense) how Fort Worth compares to peer cities.

### 1.3 Understanding NIBRS Figures

NIBRS compiles detailed reports on two types of offenses: Group “A” offenses and Group “B” offenses. The two groupings are based on the amount of reporting required for each. Both incidents and arrests are reported for Group “A” offenses, while only arrests are reported for Group “B” offenses.

The following criteria is used to determine whether a crime should be designated as a Group “A” offense:

1. The seriousness or significance of the offense.
2. The frequency or volume of its occurrence.
3. The prevalence of the offense nationwide.
4. The probability of the offense being brought to law enforcement’s attention.
5. The likelihood that law enforcement is the best channel for collecting data regarding the offense.
6. The burden placed on law enforcement in collecting data on the offense.
7. The national statistical validity and usefulness of the collected data.
8. The national UCR Program’s responsibility to make crime data available not only to law enforcement but to others having a legitimate interest in it.

Group “A” offenses are categorized into one of the three following categories: 1) Crimes Against Persons; 2) Crimes Against Property; 3) Crimes Against Society.

- 1) Crimes Against Persons = Scores one offense for each victim
- 2) Crimes Against Property = Scores one offense for each distinct operation  
(except Motor Vehicle Theft / one offense is counted per stolen vehicle)
- 3) Crime Against Society = Scores one offense for each violation

#### **NIBRS Group A includes the following 22 Offenses:**

- Homicide Offenses
- Sex Offenses, Forcible
- Sex Offenses, Non-forcible
- Robbery
- Assault Offenses
- Burglary / Breaking and Entering
- Larceny / Theft Offenses
- Motor Vehicle Theft
- Arson
- Bribery
- Counterfeiting / Forgery
- Destruction / Damage / Vandalism of Property
- Drug / Narcotic Offenses
- Embezzlement
- Extortion / Blackmail
- Fraud Offenses
- Gambling Offenses
- Kidnapping / Abduction
- Pornography / Obscene Material
- Prostitution Offenses
- Stolen Property Offenses
- Weapon Law Violations

UCR Part I includes the following eight offenses: Criminal Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson.

### 1.4 Significant Methodology and Definition Differences

A significant difference between NIBRS and UCR Traditional Summary Reporting is that for Crimes Against Persons, NIBRS counts the number of victims, while UCR counts the number of incidents. Consequentially, NIBRS figures tend to show more Crimes Against Person than UCR figures. In addition, the definitions for Part 1 offenses used in Summary Reporting are different than the offense definitions used by the NIBRS. # **National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS)**

## Third Quarter 2012 Citywide NIBRS Crime Report

2.1 Overall, citywide Group A and B crime decreased 7.9 percent in the Third Quarter of 2012. Crimes Against Persons decreased 7.2 percent overall for the quarter, with significant decreases in murder and assault offenses, while sexual assaults experienced an increase. Crimes Against Property decreased 11.8 percent overall in the Third Quarter, with fairly significant decreases in burglary, fraud and counterfeiting. The following table provides a comprehensive list of Fort Worth's citywide NIBRS Group A offenses by Crimes Against Persons, Crimes Against Property, and Crimes Against Society. These trends and enforcement efforts are explained in greater detail throughout this report.

### 2.3 Crimes Against Persons (NIBRS - Group A)

Crimes Against Persons decreased 7.2 percent overall in the Third Quarter, with 3,296 offenses (victims) reported in Third Quarter 2012 compared to 3,552 offenses (victims) reported in Third Quarter 2011. Most notable were an increase in sexual assaults and decreases in murder and aggravated assaults. Of all the Crimes Against Persons, approximately 48 percent were known to be domestic-related.

There were nine murder and non-negligent manslaughter victims, which reflects a decrease of six victims this quarter compared to Third Quarter 2011. All nine cases have been filed. These murders were spurred by a range of motives, including four arguments, three domestic disputes, one drug case and one case of child abuse. Five incidents involved a firearm. There were four homicides in Council District 5, (which includes a double homicide involving a victim who was fifteen weeks pregnant), two homicides each in Council Districts 4 and 7, and one homicide in Council District 2.

Most Crimes Against Persons are simple assaults, defined under NIBRS as “An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration, or loss of consciousness.” Simple assaults decreased 7.4 percent this quarter, and approximately 63 percent of simple assault cases were known to be domestic-related.

The second-largest Crimes Against Persons category is aggravated assaults. Aggravated assaults decreased 11 percent in the Third Quarter. Approximately 42 percent of the aggravated assaults were domestic-related. Approximately 52 percent occurred within a residence, 25 percent near a roadway, 10 percent in a parking lot or parking garage, and four percent in a bar or night club. A total of 208 aggravated assault arrests were made during the Third Quarter of 2012.

Intimidation, another assault offense, is defined as “to unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.” Intimidation offenses decreased 6.3 percent in the Third Quarter.

### 2.3 Crimes Against Persons (NIBRS - Group A) Continued...

Kidnapping/Abduction decreased 5.6 percent, with two fewer offenses in Third Quarter 2012 compared to Third Quarter 2011. It is important to understand what is included in this count.

**Kidnapping/Abduction** is defined by the National Incident Based Reporting System as “the unlawful seizure, transportation, and/or detention of a person against his/her will or of a minor without the consent of his/her custodial parent or legal guardian.”

The Texas Penal Code further divides this definition into four categories: unlawful restraint, kidnapping, aggravated kidnapping, and unlawful transport. Please refer to Texas Penal Code Title 5, Chapter 20 for full definitions, but below are abbreviated definitions of each:


- **Unlawful restraint:** Intentionally or knowingly [restraining] another person.  
*Restrain: Restrict a person’s movements without consent, so as to interfere substantially with the person’s liberty, by moving the person from one place to another or by confining the person. Restraint without consent is accomplished if by force, intimidation, or deception or any means.*
- **Kidnapping:** Intentionally or knowingly [abducting] another person ... not coupled with intent to use or to threaten to use deadly force.
- **Aggravated Kidnapping:** Intentionally or knowingly [abducting] another person with the intent [for example] to hold him for ransom or reward ... use him as a shield or hostage...inflict bodily injury.
- **Unlawful Transport:** For pecuniary benefit [transporting] an individual in a manner that is designed to conceal the individual from ... law enforcement authorities ... and [creating] a substantial likelihood that the individual will suffer serious bodily injury or death.

Of the 34 kidnapping offenses this quarter, there were 21 unlawful restraints, four kidnappings and nine aggravated kidnappings. In approximately 94 percent of all cases, the victim knew the suspect, and 71 percent were domestic-related (primarily involving dating or child custody issues). In 20 cases, the victim was dating or married to the suspect at the time of the kidnapping.

There were 121 forcible rape offenses in the Third Quarter of 2012 - representing a 21 percent increase from the Third Quarter of 2011. Of all forcible rape offenses in the quarter, 65 percent were known offender-related. Approximately 40 percent of all victims were 17 years of age or under. No serial offenders have been identified. The Sex Crimes Unit understands the seriousness of these crimes and continues the investigative process with the goals of bringing perpetrators to justice and providing closure for our victims.

The “Other” forcible sex offense category includes forcible sodomy, sexual assault with an object, and forcible fondling. These offenses decreased .7% this quarter. Approximately 85 percent involved victims 17 years of age or under.

## 2.4 Crimes Against Property (NIBRS - Group A)

Crimes Against Property decreased 11.8 percent overall, with 11,781 offenses reported in Third Quarter 2012 compared to 13,358 in Third Quarter 2011. Significant decreases include fraud (-39.9%), counterfeiting (-34.6%), arson (-25%) and burglary (-20.9%), while motor vehicle theft increased (9.1%).



Motor vehicle theft increased 9.1% this quarter compared to Third Quarter 2011. A total of 37 bait car deployments occurred within the Third Quarter, which is less than normal due to a server upgrade that occurred in August. A total of fifteen arrests were made for motor vehicle theft.

Burglaries decreased 20.9 percent, with decreases in residential (-22.8%), business (-12.7%), and "other" (-13.2%) burglaries. Of the 92 repeat locations, 65.6% were residences. In the Third Quarter of 2012, the Fort Worth Police Department arrested 176 suspects for burglary.

There was a 3.4 percent decrease in robberies. Approximately 32 percent of all incidents occurred at businesses, while 18 percent occurred at residences. A total of 104 arrests were made for robbery. Approximately 45 percent involved a firearm, while 36 percent were personal weapon incidents (involving hands, fists, feet, etc.).

## 2.5 Crimes Against Society (NIBRS - Group A)

Crimes Against Society offenses are a reflection of the department's enforcement efforts and are counted as one offense per violation. There was a 3.1 percent decrease in Crimes Against Society in the Third Quarter 2012. Prostitution violations decreased 77.9%, while weapons laws increased 15.8 percent.

Group "B" offenses are reported only when an individual is arrested. A Group "B" arrest report does not include incident data but uses only data elements that describe the arrestee and the circumstances of the arrest. Group "B" offenses increased 1.2 percent this quarter.

## 2.7 Gang Unit Report

A total of 267 gang-related incidents occurred in the Third Quarter 2012 compared to 383 incidents in Third Quarter 2011 — a 30.3 percent decrease. It should be noted that a single incident may involve multiple offenses. For example, an incident may involve a narcotic violation and an assault offense, which would be documented within one report and then flagged as a gang-related incident. The table below shows the number of offenses within the gang-related incident reports.

### What is Gang-Related Crime?

*Gang-Related Crime* is any criminal act, including but not limited to those involving gang members or gang associates committed for the benefit or furtherance of any criminal gang.

Figure 10 - Third Quarter 2012 Gang-Related Offenses By Division





Figure 11 - 2009-2012 Comparison of Citywide Gang-Related Offenses


Figure 12 - Summary of Offenses By Council District

# **Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Traditional Summary Report**

#### 4.1 Third Quarter 2012 Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Traditional Summary Report

Uniform Crime Report (UCR) Traditional Summary Reporting is a collective effort on the part of jurisdictions throughout the United States to present a nationwide representation of crime using eight of the most serious and most commonly-reported offenses — Criminal Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft and Arson — collectively known as Part I Offenses. In the Summary Reporting System, the number of criminal incidents are counted, in contrast to the more detailed data collected (using a different methodology) through the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS).

Part I Offenses decreased 8.2 percent in Third Quarter 2012 compared to Third Quarter 2011. Below represents the number of criminal incidents for each Part I crime:

#### Quick Note About Reporting Differences

A significant difference between NIBRS and UCR Traditional Summary Reporting is the number of crimes being reported and the methodology used. For example, for Crimes Against Persons, NIBRS counts the number of victims, while UCR counts the number of incidents, which can result in NIBRS figures being higher than UCR figures depending on the number of victims involved in the incidents. In addition, the definitions for Part 1 offenses used in Summary Reporting are different than the offense definitions used by the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS). The Fort Worth Police Department submits NIBRS data to the Texas Department of Public Safety (TxDPS), which is then submitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). The FBI then converts the NIBRS data into the UCR Traditional Summary Reporting for publication in the annual *Crime in the United States* publication. Since this report is based on snapshot data queried on December 12, 2012, data queried before or after this date may vary from this report.

## Fort Worth Participates in Statewide SWAT Competition

The FWPd SWAT section recently participated in the Texas Tactical Peace Officer's Association annual SWAT Competition. Two five-person teams competed against thirty teams from various parts of the State (and one from Germany).

For three days, the teams participated in various events, including the Super SWAT course, Sniper Resolution, Hostage Rescue, and Downed Officer — culminating in a grueling obstacle course.



## SWAT Hosts U.S. Marshals Training

In September, the SWAT section hosted a regional training exercise for the U.S. Marshals Service (USMS) Northern District of Texas. The event took place over the course of two days at the SWAT Weapons Range.

The training, held at the request of the USMS, was in keeping with the recommendations from their Fugitive Apprehension Risk Mitigation Assessment Team (FARMAT). The training provided by SWAT covered many of the skills taught in the Marshals' own High Risk Fugitive Apprehension training. As officers and agents worked on vehicle assaults, shield work, and shooting drills, it became even more apparent that the proposed weapons range will be a vital training venue for the tactical units of the entire region, as well as for Fort Worth's purposes.


The Marshals reported that they were able to save taxpayers approximately \$50,000 by partnering with the Fort Worth SWAT section.

The unit's role was to welcome and interact with the dignitaries as they arrived and to bring Fort Worth's Western heritage to this monumental event. The unit participated in events that weekend and had opportunities to meet with the two crews of the USS Fort Worth, which included Fort Worth native and Paschal Graduate Dylan Perez.

## Emma Richardson Award

On September 13, Captain Kamper was awarded the 2012 Emma Richardson Award. Emma Richardson was the first female Fort Worth police officer. The Fort Worth Police Officers Association established the annual Emma Richardson Memorial Award to recognize an officer who embodies the spirit, dedication and tenacity that Emma Richardson personified. Through the years, Captain Kamper has worked in Patrol, Bike Patrol, CACU, IAD, Narcotics, Training and the Youth Division. While working in CACU, she earned a CID Detective of the Year Award and has continued to be a highly valued and respected member of the Fort Worth Police Department and the community at-large.



## Cutting-Edge Techniques Improve Public Safety

The Information Management Section (IMS) has undergone significant changes in recent months. In order to improve the product provided to Department leadership, IMS has changed its processes to enable analysts to focus on developing strategies to address crime at the patrol division level, including assisting in identifying prolific offenders.

Based on this focused approach, IMS continues to write operational recommendations for targeted crime suppression details. Two details were conducted this quarter, targeting fifteen areas with the highest concentrations of reported crimes and calls for service. Zero Tolerance (ZT) wrote the final operation plans based, in part, on IMS recommendations. IMS also wrote additional operational recommendations for teen curfew details conducted by ZT during late June, July and August. This was implemented to combat juvenile crime during the summer, while teens were not in school.

IMS continues to examine new strategies to combat crime in Fort Worth. The Section has also continued to write crime suppression details utilizing other units — both within and outside the Department — that will assist in reducing, suppressing and disrupting crime in the City.

## Cowtown Project Success 1 Helps Teens

Cowtown Project Success 1 (PS/1), a program targeting Fort Worth's homeless teens, launched in March as a pilot program, which sparked from the vision of FWPDP Officer Julie Cox, liaison to the unsheltered and elderly population. The program outgrew its facility and moved in July to Broadway Baptist Church, and by September 27, it was granted non-profit corporation status.

Officer Cox encountered many unsheltered teens who were not runaways, but had entered homeless status with their parents and families due to economic hardships such as job loss, foreclosure or long-term illness. Cox said children from homeless families often end up in a similar situation as adults. This program aims to reverse the trend by teaching at-risk kids marketable skills.

During the third quarter, several organizations which have taken on PS/1 as a charity to raise funds and awareness grew, including the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce, Magnolia on the Green and Covington Wireless.

To date, approximately 50 teens have participated in the program. The class is limited to 15 students and lasts three months. However, graduates may return as mentors for the new teens and move on to a new project. In addition, development of an offshoot program started in the first of September, which is a mentoring program for LGBTQ teens.
